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Freshman Honors Seminar

We are currently revising the Freshman Honors Seminar "The Immigrant Experience: Unity and Diversity" for next year (Spring semester, 1988) and would like to invite any interested faculty member to contribute to the course. This semester, the course has consisted of four "modules," each taught by a different faculty member representing the departments of Sociology, English, Political Science and Art. The course featured a weekend trip to New York City and a tour of various ethnic neighborhoods and other sites relevant to the course.

For next year, we want to retain the multi-disciplinary approach and, if possible, get even more faculty members involved. Therefore, we invite any interested faculty member to submit a proposal for a "module" of the course. The module may be as brief as one class period or as long as three weeks. (Compensation will be prorated accordingly). We would be especially interested in perspectives on immigrants and/or ethnic Americans in urban settings in general and New York City in particular. Some possible topics: recent legislation and public policy on immigration, geography of immigration and/or urban areas, historical perspectives, immigrants and schooling, economics and/or business perspectives, the immigrant scientist in America, the immigrant in the American theater, etc.

Dr. Park, Department of Economics was interviewed by Kathy Barnstorff of Channel 13 (ABC TV Network) on the subject of imposing U.S. sanctions against Japanese imported products. Dr. Park responded to the questions regarding the effect of such imposition of the tariff against selected Japanese electronic projects and possible trade wars between the U. S. and Japan. Dr. Park explained that Japan is the second largest trade partner of the U. S. and the trade war between these countries will not prevail in the future and they will solve the problems by negotiated agreements. The interview was televised during the prime news hour, 6 p.m., on April 17, 1987.
