

Qualified Diesel-Powered Highway Vehicles credit

If you own a diesel car, truck or van you may be entitled to a credit against your 1984 Federal income taxes. This little-known credit is called the Qualified Diesel-Powered Highway Vehicles credit and is asserted on Form 4136. The credit ranges from \$102 to \$17 for an automobile and from \$198 to \$33 for a truck or van. The following table indicates the credit available:

Next month, Newport News--and CNC in particular--will host the Virginia Humanities Conference for the first time in tits twenty-year history.

As President of the Conference, I would like to invite you to attend all or part of the Conference, which is scheduled for Friday, April 12, and Saturday, April 13.

Since brochures have been placed in all mailboxes, I will emphasize some of the highlights of the meeting, rather than recite all of the details.

While the theme "Human Values in the Eighties" embraces many subjects, you will find that sessions on Friday afternoon address the culture of blacks during the twentieth century. I would especially recommend the lecture by Bruce Kellner, Professor of English, Millersville State University (PA), and author of The Harlem Renaissance: A Historical Dictionary of the Era (Greenwood, 1984).

It is also possible to find a "track" of presentations on education-beginning with Amitai Etzioni's lecture on Friday noon (co-sponsored with the Dean's Colloquia Series) and continuing throughout Saturday morning.

Several of our colleagues are featured on the program--Doc Powell will speak on "Tradition and Change; The Role of Religious Myth and Ritual" (Friday, 10 a.m.); Jim Morris's Paper "The Development of the Moral-Economic Assumptions of the Social Gospel Protestants in the Late Nineteenth Century" and Marshall Booker's paper "Economic Darwinism and the Future of Capitalism" will both be featured in the session that starts at 2:45 p.m. on Friday.

The registration fee for the entire Conference (including meals) is \$24, but you are welcome to drop in for as many sessions as you wish without charge. I do ask that if you intend to join us for meals that you register by sending the Registration Form included in the brochure to me no later than April 1.

The Virginia Humanities Conference represents considerable financial committments on the part of the College, as well as the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy. Please make a point of attending at least one session of the Conference and encourage your students to do the same, so that the response to our programs will be impressive.

Student Affairs Report

It was reported at the Student Affairs Meeting that the Homecoming for this year was extremely successful. It is apparent that students and alumni are taking a more active role in CNC's functions. There was a report from Keith McLoughland that the college appears to be attracting and retaining students of a better academic background. This observation is based on the fact that fewer students dropped out between the Fall and Spring semesters for the academic year 1984 - 1985. It was also reported that Spring Registration (1985) statistically at this time shows a marked improvement over last years Spring Registration (1984). It was encouraged by the members of the Student Affairs Committee that a professional marketing program would further aid the fine job being done by admissions and such a marketing program could be funded through developmental funds.
