

### Candidates for Vice President for Institutional Advancement

The VPIA search committee has identified four finalists to be interviewed on campus over the next several weeks. As is our custom, an open session has been scheduled for each. That session will be held from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. in the Anderson Auditorium (A-105) on the candidate's interview day. For your information, a brief profile of each finalist follows:

Friday, March 25 - J. Jeffrey Robison

Mr. Robison has been Associate Director of University Development at the University of Florida (Gainesville) since 1985. There he supervises the University's programs in Annual Giving, Corporate and Foundation Relations, Major Gifts, Planned Giving, Publications, Research and Special Events. From 1980 to 1985 he was Director of Corporate and Foundation Relations at the same school. From 1978 to 1980 he worked as Director of Annual Giving and Assistant Coordinator of the Presidents Club at The Ohio State University. He has also worked as a registrar at Ohio State and Marshall University. He holds the Master of Education degree from Ohio State.

Friday, April 1 - Dr. Frances Hunter
Dr. Hunter has worked in development at Arkansas State University since 1983. She is currently the Director there with major responsibilities for the Annual Fund, Gift Clubs, Bank Chair Scholarships, volunteer programs, Deferred Giving, mail solicitations, and planning. Since 1967, she has also held a tenured position in ASU's English Department. Her Ph.D. in Higher

Education from the University of Mississippi and her dissertation was entitled "Private Fund Raising by American Association of State Colleges and Universities Member Institutions."

Tuesday, April 19 - Stephen K. Gauly

Mr. Gauly is currently the Executive Director of Development at Syracuse University with responsibilities for the areas of Major Gifts, Planned Giving and annual support. From 1983 to 1985 he worked as Director of Annual Support at Alleghany College and was that school's Director of Alumni Affairs for the two years preceding. From 1979-1981 he was the Regional Director of Development for Syracuse with special development responsibilities in western New York State. Mr. Gauly holds an M.S. in Higher Education Administration from Syracuse.

Thursday, April 21 - Timothy R. DuFore

Mr. DuFore has been the Director of Development at the University of Akron since 1985. His current responsibilities include general fund raising and the university's programs in annual, capital and endowed funds. In 1984 and 1985, he worked as Akron's Associate Director of Development, the Director of College-Centered Programs and Director of the Alumni Fund. From 1980 to 1984, he worked at Radford University as its Director of Development and Executive Director of its Foundation. For two years preceding that, he was Radford's Director of Alumni Affairs. Mr. DuFore holds an M.A. from Bowling Green State University and has pursued the doctorate at Virginia Tech and Akron.

The search committee encourages all members of the College community to meet these candidates

at our open sessions.

### Humanities Endowment Names Local Student "Younger Scholar" for 1988

Washington, March 11 -- The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) has selected Catherine E. Paul as an NEH Younger Scholar for 1988.

Paul, a junior at Menchville High School in Newport News, Va., was selected in a nationwide competition of high school and undergraduate college students who submitted proposals for independent summer research projects in history; literature, philosophy, foreign languages and other humanities disciplines.

Paul, who lives in Newport News, is one of 121 college students and 45 high school students to win NEH Younger Scholar awards for 1988. Winners of this year's awards were selected from 774 eligible applicants representing 48 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

Under the guidance of Dr. George Teschner, Associate Professor of Philosophy at CNC, Paul will use the NEH grant of \$1,800 to work on a project entitled, "The Limits of Language in the Tao Te Ching and the Chuang Tzu." Awards are \$2,200 for college students and \$1,800 for high school students. Each stipend includes \$400 for the project advisor.

MAY 23 (MONDAY): ARRIVAL IN MEXICO - Departure from Norfolk at 8:00 a.m. on Piedmont flight 87 to Miami, arriving at 11:01 a.m. Continue on Aeroméxico flight 413, leaving Miami at 5:45 p.m. Arrival in Merida at 5:40 p.m. and welcome by GET representative. Transfer to your beautiful first class hotel Montejo Palace, located in centric and attractive Paseo de Montejo. Orientation meeting. Dinner and lodging at your hotel.

MAY 24 (TUESDAY): TOUR OF MERIDA - RUINS OF UXMAL - LIGHT & SOUND SHOW - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Morning tour of the city of Mérida including visit to the Museum of Anthropology. Mid-afternoon departure of the group to the archaeological zone of Uxmal for visit of the ruins. Time to swim and relax at Hotel Uxmal Misión. Dinner and return to the ruins to watch the spectacular Light & Sound Show, an experience you will never forget. Return to your hotel in Mérida for lodging.

MAY 25 (WEDNESDAY): MERIDA - AT LEISURE - Full American breakfast at the hotel. Day free of scheduled activities to shop and explore the town on your own. Dinner at the hotel. Attendance in the evening to a musical or folkloric presentation.

MAY 26 (THURSDAY): MERIDA - TOUR OF CHICHEN-ITZA RUINS - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Departure to the archaeological zone of Chichen-Itza, the largest vestiges of Mayan Civilization. Visit of the ruins, including the observatory and the ball court, where a game similar to basketball was played with the players' lives at stake. Full buffet lunch at nearby restaurant and afternoon transfer back to Mérida. Lodging at your hotel.

MAY 27 (FRIDAY): MERIDA - FLIGHT TO OAXACA - RUINS OF MONTE ALBAN - Early morning transfer to airport for Aeromexico flight 500 to Oaxaca, leaving Mérida at 8:15 a.m. Arrival in Oaxaca at 10:20 a.m. and transfer of the group to your hotel Misión de Los Angeles (telephone 5-15 00). Balance of the day free. Dinner and lodging.

MAY 28 (SATURDAY): OAXACA - RUINS OF MITLA - TULE - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Morning visit of the ruins of Mitla and the giant tree of Tule. Balance of the afternoon free. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Oaxaca.

MAY 29 (SUNDAY): OAXACA - RUINS OF MONTE ALBAN - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Lunch. Afternoon visit of the nearby ruins of the sacred city of Monte Alban. Lodging at your hotel.

MAY 30 (MONDAY): OAXACA - CANCUN - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Transfer to the airport for our Aeroméxico flight 502 to Mexico City, departing at 12:55 p.m. and arriving at 1:50 p.m. Continue on Aeroméxico flight 577 to Cancun, departing at 4:45 p.m. Arrival in Cancun at 7:25 p.m. and transfer to our beachfront hotel Las Perlas, in this beautiful and renowned beach resort. Lodging.

MAY 31 (TUESDAY): CANCUN - ENJOYING GORGEOUS CANCUN BEACH - Full American breakfast at your hotel. Day free to enjoy the beach, swimming and relaxing in the crystal clear waters of the Caribbean and the pristine white sand of Cancun. Lodging at your hotel.

#### Novelist and Storywriter Toni Cade Bambara to Appear on Campus

Novelist and storywriter Toni Cade Bambara will appear at Christopher Newport College on Tuesday, March 29, to conduct a fiction workshop and give a public reading.

The reading--free and open to the entire community--will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Christopher's, the Campus Center cafeteria.

The workshop--for students and other writers of fiction--will be held in the Campus Center Board Room (CC-214) from 4 to 6 p.m.

Ms. Bambara will conclude her visit to Newport News with a special presentation for ninth grade students of the Newport News Public Schools on March 30, in the Gaines Theater at CNC.

Among her award-winning fiction are two novels--IF BLESSING COMES (1987) and THE SALT EATERS (1980)-as well as highly regarded collections of stories--THE SEA BIRDS ARE STILL ALIVE (1977) and GORILLA MY LOVE (1972). (Copies of her work are available at the CNC Bookstore.)

She has edited two important anthologies--TALES AND SHORT STORIES FOR BLACK FOLK (1971) and THE BLACK WOMAN (1970).

A native of New York, Ms. Bambara was educated at Queens College and the City College of New York. She has taught at Spelman College, Duke, Rutgers and other colleges and universities. Her mission as an educator and social leader has led to her doing social work for the New York Department of Health and serving as Humanities Consultant for the New Jersey Department of Corrections.

More recently, Ms. Bambara has written and produced documentaries and television shows. She was production consultant for THE BOMBING OF OSAGE, WHYY's award-winning documentary of the 1985 MOVE tragedy in Philadelphia.

Ms. Bambara's stories are frequently reprinted—in high school textbooks and other anthologies—and have been translated into Swedish, German, Japanese, Norwegian, and Spanish. Her visit, sponsored by the Department of English and the School of Letters and Natural Science, is the third event in Christopher Newport College's 1988 Writers Series.
