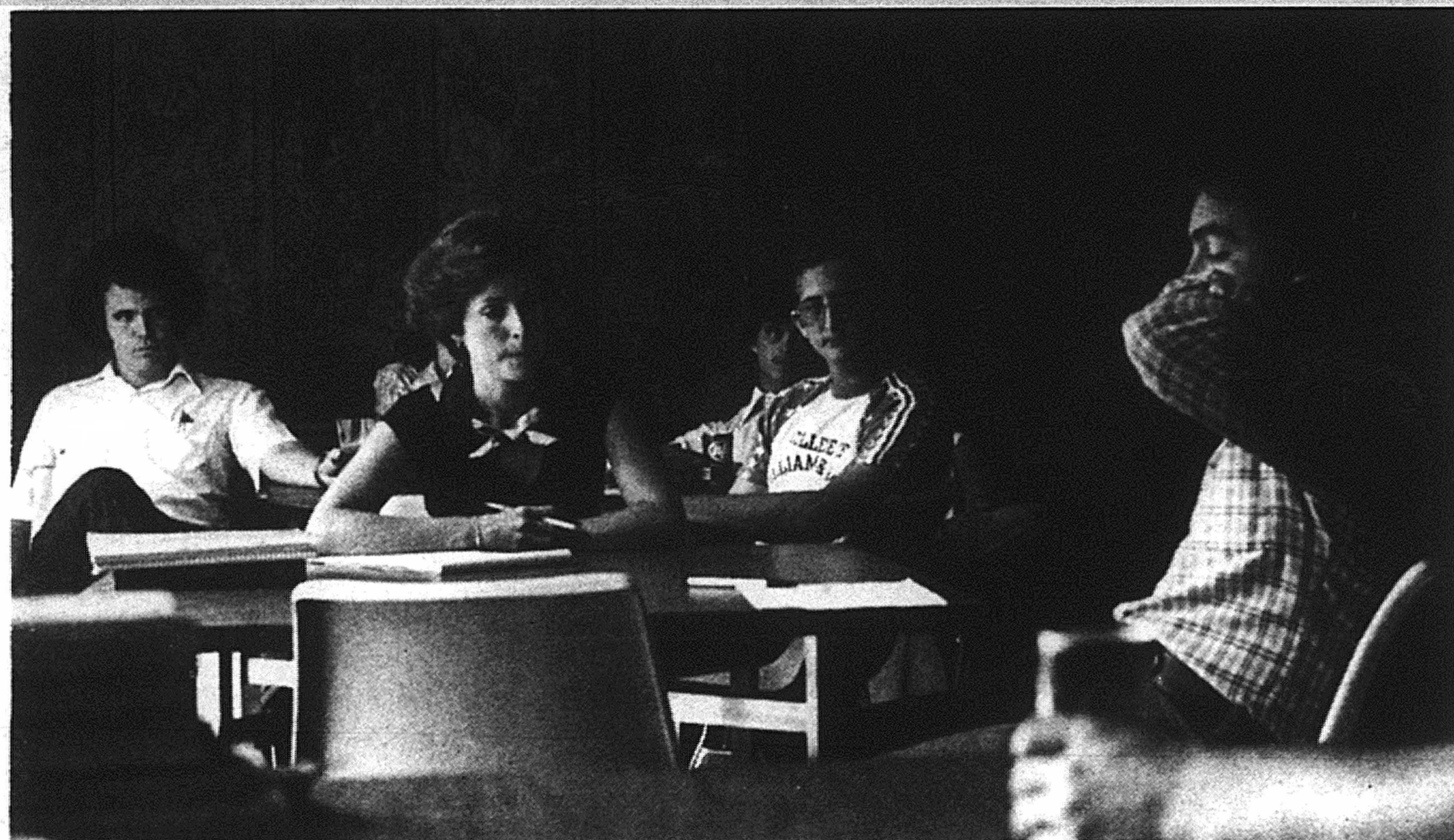

This year's senate will represent the six major divisions of study, as opposed to the previous methods of representatives from each class - i.e. freshman, sophomore, etc. Any student with an overall grade point average of 2.0, who is currently enrolled at Christopher Newport is eligible.

One may pick up his or her petition, to be signed by fifteen (15) CNC card holding students, from the secretary of the Dean of Student Affairs, Ms. Theolia Lewis. This petition must be returned no later

than 5 p.m. Friday, September 23, to the office of the Dean of Student Affairs. There will be no extension!

Upon completing the petition, one must receive a briefing from Charlie Brown at CC-230, concerning campaign procedure. Elections will be held September 28 and 29.

Doane captures PTPA Men's Singles

Dr. Robert Doane, Assistant Professor of Political Science and the Women's Tennis Coach, captured the Peninsula Tennis Patrons Association's Mens Singles title during the past Labor Day weekend.

Doane defeated A.G. Womble, the number 2 seeded player, by a score of 6-2, 6-1. He also defeated the number 1 seeded player, Bill Dando, as well as John Bennett and Ed Richards en route to the crown.

Dr. Doane used a powerful serve and a crunching forehand to defeat his adversaries. Combining these assets with his disciplined mental approach to the game, he wore down each opponent. Dr. Doane's strategy and his ability to exploit the opponent's weaknesses proved to be the key to his victory.

The PTPA Consolation Tournament, which is basically a tournament for non-winners from the summer season, has served as an impetus for greater accomplishments by several previous winners. Last year's tournament winner as well as the previous year's winner were both ranked in the top eight of local tennis players by the Daily Press and Times-Herald at the conclusion of this summer's tennis season.

Dr. Doane is determined to make a clean sweep of top honors by participating in the doubles competition this weekend.

The event is open to the public and is being held at the Christopher Newport Tennis Courts.

CNC Netters garner top honors

This week's tennis action included the Captain Netters in topform both on and off the courts. All players from last season's championship squad were rewarded for their superb efforts of last season in the form of All-Conference honors.

Selected to the DIAC All-Conference Tennis Team were Mike Hash and John Roberts, No. 2 doubles, Alex Vasquez and Sean Baier, No. 2 doubles.

All-Conference singles honors went to Roberts at number 2, Larry Shelton at number 4, and Alex Vasquez at number 5. John Mouring, last season's No.6 singles player was heralded with his selection to the DIAC All-Academic squad.

Included in award honors was Head Coach Jack Armistead, selected as the Conference's Tennis Coach of the Year. This is the 2nd time in 3 years that he has been selected for this highest honor.

On-court action found the Captains participating in several tournaments. In the Peninsula Tennis Patrons Association consolation tournament at CNC, Coach

Armistead defeated Larry Shelton in the round of 16's, 6-0, 6-2. John Mouring played well enough to advance to the quarter-finals before losing to A.G. Womble, 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. Sean Baier, playing a consistently strong game, advanced to the semi-finals before yielding by a score of 6-1, 6-4.

While his team members were playing in the PTPA tournament, Mike Hash was involved in the action of the Grand Prix Masters Tournament. This tournament was limited to the top eight local players evaluated by their performance during summer tournaments.

In his initial match, Mike played Brian Staub, Atlantic Christian College star and the tournament's eventual winner. While playing well but not well enough, Mike was defeated, 6-4, 6-2. His next opponent was William and Mary freshman Paul Daus. Hash was not up to par physically and was forced to retire due to a leg injury. After numerous heat treatments for the injury Mike returned for his evening encounter with the number 6

rated player, Ron Staples.

In what some spectators classifies as the best match of the tournament, Hash defeated Staples in three hours, 6-1, 5-7, 7-5. By defeating Staples, Mike ended the summer season ranked 5th among local tennis players. At the conclusion of the match, Mike commented, "It's an excellent tournament, coupled with the Summer Circuit, it has improved my game."

Next action for the Netters will be the Alumni Match as they tune up for their match with Eastern Mennonite.

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Movie Review: *The Last Remake of Beau Geste*

The eyes have it! Marty Feldman employs visual tricks, burlesque gags, and almost every old movie cliché known to man in his *Last Remake of Beau Geste*; making his diploma from the Mel Brooks Academy of Irreverent Humor and Comic Images successfully pay off. However, now with the *LR of BG*, he is proving himself an accomplished writer and director as well; also displaying his usual knack for comic performances.

Beginning with his first appearance, destroying the famous, spinning Universal Picture Globe, Mr. Feldman continuously tickles the screen with ridiculous sight gags.

Using black and white, he creates an imaginative parody of the old Keystone Kop schtick, in which he is aided through a hilarious maze to a desparate prison escape devised by the warden himself. This is one of many comic twists. In another instance photographer Albert Whittock splices together a mirage scene where Feldman takes a ludicrous step out of the Universal Picture into the original Paramount production of *Beau Geste* and confronts the late, great Gary Cooper. (We learn the reason Cooper talked so slow when the two men catch a fairly good buzz off some Moroccan Gold). Another scene has the misfitted French Foreign Legion firing blanks at each other while Beau Geste plays Benny Goodman on the battle bugle.

Portraying Flavia, Ann Margaret is lascivious, luscious, and evil. She makes her way into your heart with lines like, "it's been a business doing pleasure with you." Her early giggly, young girl image abandoned, she now provides consistent glamour and class in accentuated Marlene Dietrich style, (her beautiful costumes, by the way, are designed by May Routh). The bedroom scene with Terry Thomas is priceless; because Ann sheds more than just her jewelry to convince the warden to aid Dibby's jailbreak. After an obviously brutal romp, Thomas turns to her with the reply, "You have made a happy man feel very old."

Michael York plays the righteously exaggerated Beau Geste. He is the typical Prince Charming character, portrayed for effect, and contrast to Feldman's role as his twin brother, Digby. York is funniest when he is able to play off another character. His best scene, demonstrative of excellent comic balance, takes place in a shower where he is thoroughly searched by a Legion non-com, who is looking for "The Blue Water" jewel. Their outrageous timing of expressions will keep you laughing well into the next four scenes.

Another notable, Peter Ustinov as Sgt. Marcoff, uses the popular hunchback gag (remember Feldman as Igor in Mel Brook's *Frankenstein*, his hump constantly moved from one side of his shoulder to the other), here Ustinov has a facial scar, which by the end of the movie, has covered all possible ground. Except this time the gag is carried further into the

ridiculous when Marcoff searches his jewelry box, looking for a dress scar.

Ed McMahon makes a cameo appearance to introduce Avery Schrieber as a used camel salesman, ("you want a good set of humps? This camel is serviced twice a day. . . . by this camel"). Even James Earl Jones makes an appearance as the skeik. No longer needed in this Arabian movie, the skeik is taught by Rudolph Valentino to speak in sub-titles, and together they ride off into the diminishing, classical rays of silent films.

The Last Remake of Beau Geste is definitely a party-type movie, and the visual images borrowing from many old movie clichés does not distract from; rather, it

adds to it's comic worth. Watch the desparate butler walking in circles to read the spinning newspaper headlines; the mud which turns to stew; the blind Ted Cassidy feeling the braille Playboy centerfold; and the young sister of Beau and Digby who practices and practices the piano only to become "an accomplished virgin," then perhaps you can understand Feldman's particular brand of satire. It's actually better than the English satire of Monty Python, though more social than political.

Anyone interested in trying out should come to practices every Tuesday or Thursday between 3:00 and 5:00 p.m. or contact Dr. Doane at 599-7097.

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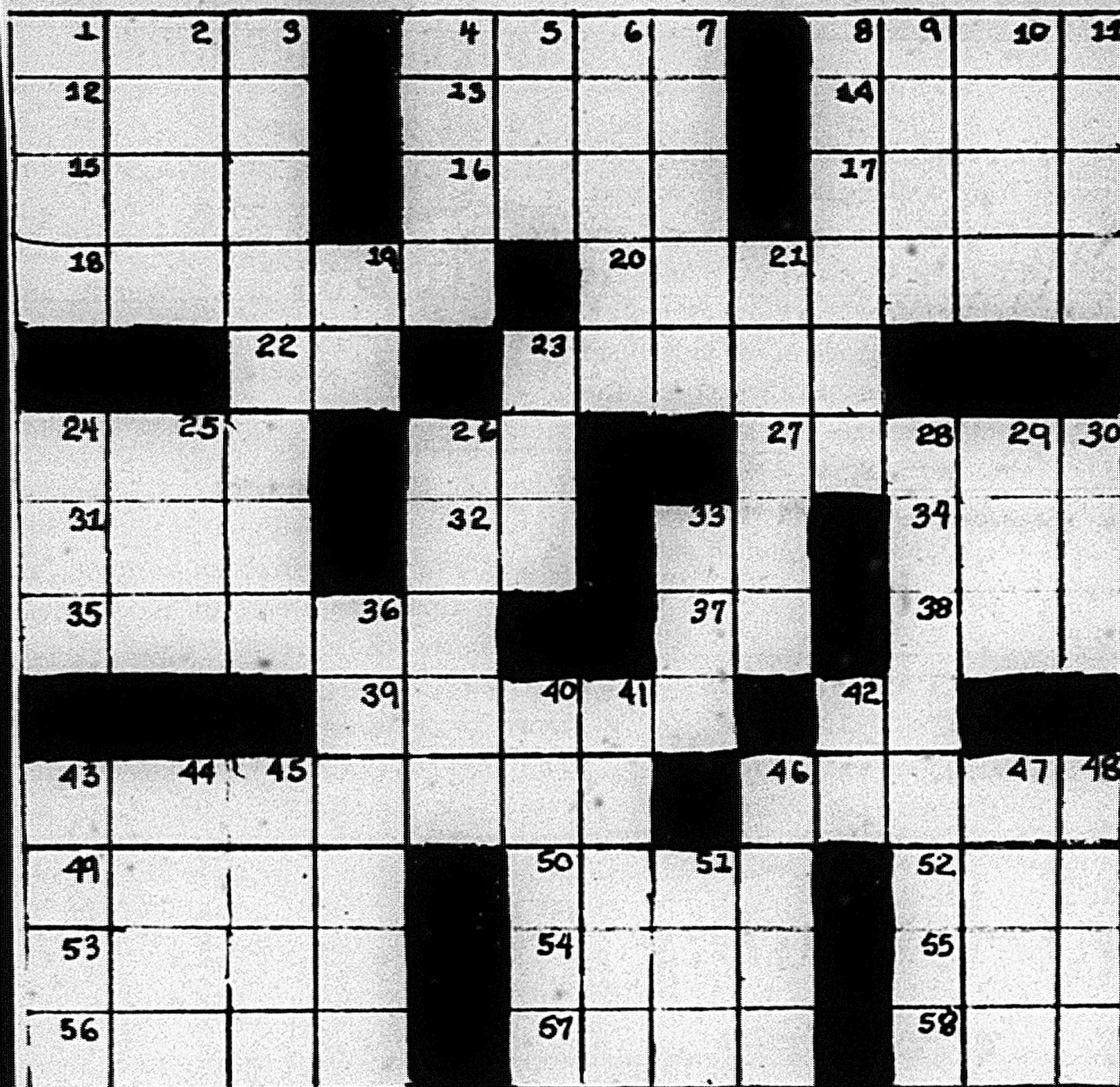
