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Dean's Colloquia Call for Speakers and Papers

The Dean William Parks Memorial Colloquia Committee is now making plans for its 1987-88 series. Accordingly, we invite nominations for outside speakers and proposals for papers from individual faculty members at this time. All presentations must be academic in tone

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and content and must have an appeal to the entire college community. Selection of speakers will be made by the Committee during the last week of April. One outside speaker and 3-4 faculty presentations (including the Brauer lecture) will be scheduled for 1987-88.

Nominations for outside speakers must include the following: (1) a cover letter indicating why this person would be appropriate to the series with some indication as to what the nominee might talk about, and (2) a résumé of the nominee's credentials.

Proposals from faculty members for papers must include the following: (1) a brief résumé, and (2) a précis of the paper indicating the importance of the research involved.

All nominations and proposals for papers must be received by Friday, April 24 in order to be considered. The decisions of the Committee will be announced in early May. Faculty members whose papers are selected will receive an honorarium of \$500.

Since last Fall the English Department at Bruton High School (York County) has been expanding the amount of time given to the reading and writing poetry in its curriculum. As the culmination of this project, Jay Paul conducted workshops on writing poetry with three groups of students, seventy-five in all, on Thursday, March 19, and again on Tuesday, March 24. These visits, along with a day-long workshop for members of the Bruton English Department in November, were sponsored by the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts.

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Linda Gordon, a senior English major, authored the script for the video introducing the Chrysler Museum's newest exhibit, "Danzig 1939: Treasures of a Community Destroyed." The script is her major project for English 491, Practicum in Public Writing.
