Tenure evaluation policy changes

The Faculty Senate, comprised of elected representatives from each college, has approved a policy which exempts tenured professors from Fall student evaluations.

There is a "well established track record of what students are thinking" in regard to tenured professors who have an "approved record," said Provost, Dr. Richard M. Summerville.

Dr. Summerville says that student evaluations in the Spring are "sufficient" for these professors, and the Fall is a "welcome respite for students."

Normally, tenured or not, professors are evaluated by students every semester, unless the tenured professor requests a waiver.

"Student evaluations make up only one of a whole set of data points taken in the evaluation of faculty," states Dr. Jane C. Webb, Associate Professor of Physics and Computer Science.

In order to obtain a waiver, a professor's request must be approved by the following chain: a group

comprised of the professor's colleagues in his/her department, the chair of the department, the dean of the college, and finally, the Provost. At any step, they may refuse to waive.

The peer group looks for the professor's competence in teaching and researching, scholarship, and service to the University and community.

Student evaluations are a part of the faculty member's dossier, which contains detailed information about the instructors performance. The peer group makes an evaluation based on the dossier as a whole.

All faculty evaluations are then presented to the Faculty Review

be evaluated.

Students ought to look at the elaborate quality of this review process, " says Dr. Webb.

Students have expressed a concern that they will not have the opportunity to evaluate teachers they only have in the Fall.

"I have had problems with some of the tenured professors in the past, and

Student admission down from 1991

When classes began this fall, Christopher Newport had a bigger name, higher tuition, an expanded campus and more faculty, but fewer students.

The current student population at CNU is 4,860, down from 5,034 in the fall of 1991. Keith F. McLoughland, Dean of Enrollment Services, attributes this 3.5% decrease to the local economy and state guidelines.

This year there are fewer part-time, unclassified students. They generally take night classes. Many adults in this category work at the Newport News Shipyard. McLoughland explained, "we were at the shipyard [recruiting students] all spring and summer, and nobody came." The lack of jobsecurity at the shipyard is keeping many people from spending extra money on college courses.

The state policies regulating who may receive in-state tuition also changed, effecting another group: military dependents. The policy once

allowed military dependents an opportunity to receive in-state tuition for one year, provided they became a state resident during that time. Virginia is the only state that no longer offers this benefit to military

The Terrace Survey Results

Results: The response to last week's survey about the changes to The Terrace restaurant was overwhelming, 12 and a half times our usual survey response of five.

The survey was not scientific by any means, but reflected the opinions of those who chose to answer the questions.

Students made up 81 percent of the results, with faculty and staff contributing 11 and eight percent, respectively.

The majority of respondents. 42 percent, said that they eat at The Terrace once or twice a week, while 24 percent never eat there.23 percent said they eat at The Terrace occasionally, and only 10 percent eat there everyday.

The range of money spent was fairly even, with only 19 percent spending between \$1.51 and \$2.50. Most respondents, 39 percent, said they spend between \$2.51 and \$3.50 per visit.

One half of those answering the survey said that they visit The Terrace less often than last semester. 24 percent said they went more often, and another eight percent said they don't go at all.

The majority of respondents do not like the renovations at The Terrace. 61 percent rated the renovations as awful, 31 percent said they were good and six percent said the changes were very good.

Hardly anyone has alcoholic beverages at the restaurant anymore. 68 percent said they never drink there, while 13 percent said they always drink and another 18 percent said they sometimes drink:


Ms. Abel's last statement about prayers is exactly where the Republican philosophy and funda-

In September

Students receive little for buy-backs

Have you ever wondered why the books you buy at the beginning of the semester cost an extraordinary amount of money, but when you sell them back, you only get a few measly dollars? Believe it or not, there are valid reasons for this outrageous difference in price.

According to Jacqueline Haskins, Director of the University Bookstore, the new books sold at the original price are slightly higher than the price the bookstore paid for them.

Why do students only receive a small amount back for returned books? The answer is simple. First, at the end of the semester, professors at CNU must notify the bookstore of which texts will be used the following semester.

The bookstore management must then determine which books currently being used will also be used the next term.

If students return new books that will be used the following semester.



On the other hand, students selling books back that will not be used the following term will only receive twenty percent (or less) of the original selling price. These books are of little use to anyone, and therefore, the bookstore must sell them to a wholesaler at a much reduced price.

Many larger universities have alternative bookstores where books are sold at a reduced rate. CNU does not have such a store, and Haskins offers two main reasons for it.

She explains that, in the first place, "no one has ever seriously brought the idea to (her) attention." Secondly, "an alternative bookstore probably would not work in an institution of this size... The student population needs to grow to approximately fifteen thousand before another bookstore would be effective."

In response to the book price problem, Sigma Tau Delta, the International English Honor Society, is planning a book exchange program to take place this semester. The program will involve trading books instead of selling old books to the bookstore.

The members are still in the process of working out the details, and further information will be given at a later date.

"I was pleased to see the Greeks of CNU band together for a much needed cause," says Gamma Phi Beta member, Carrie Winfrey.



Former State Dept. interpreter speaks at CNU

Cornelius Iida addressed a forum of students, faculty, and staffmembers in the John Gaines theatre on Monday, September 21. Mr. Iida is a former State Department Japanese interpreter who served under Presidents Reagan and Carter. He discussed the issue of "Bridging the Cultural Gap between Japan and the United States."

Mr. Iida examined the cultural gaps that exist between our two nations and stated that these gaps have led to a situation in which "your feelings, your thoughts are misunderstood and you are victimized." Mr. Iida explained that the only solution to this problem was that "we must become the bridges." He described his years as a State Department interpreter as being a "little bridge."

In examining the gaps that exist, Mr. Iida cited one example in particular--the "Kabuki episode." While on a trip to Tokyo, Mr. Iida attended a Kabuki performance with then President Carter.

Kabuki is a traditional Japanese drama with singing and dancing in which all of the performers are male. During this particular performance there were several unusual occurrences. In a typical Kabuki performance, members of the audience participate in the play by vocally supporting and praising the actors.

However, the Japanese government was concerned about the possible reaction of the U.S. security agents to this and instructed the audience to remain silent. At the end of the performance, President Carter gave a standing ovation and the rest of the audience joined him.

This was highly irregular because the audience expresses their enjoyment during the performance,

The actors were'so overwhelmed by President Carter's admiration that they invited him to join them on stage. In Japanese culture this is considered to be a great honor for no one is allowed on the stage without the express permission of the actors. Mr. Iida expressed that this was one instance in which the cultural gap had been spanned.

Mr. Iida stated that "if you would bridge the culture, you would do well to consider yourself the bridge to be traveled...the sides could be brought closer and closer together."

He expressed that President Carter was an ideal example of one who could bridge the cultural gap, "he was a very compassionate person... he asked about how my family had been during the war [World War II] and never mentioned that he had been shot down by Japanese gunfire."

Mr. Iida said that the gap between our cultures is already being shortened by the younger Japanese generation.

He explained that this generation is more apt to accept western ways and model their lives on those of their grandparents and ancient Japanese culture which emphasizes the importance of bridging these gaps.

The younger generation also sees that in the western societies there is "more to life than being efficient...they [the people of the United States] are more compassionate."

Mr. Iida is a self-employed author and lecturer. He has written a collection of essays "On Fairness" and an autobiographical account of his conversion from Buddhism to Christianity entitled Hour of Jesus.

These works have not yet been translated into English, but are available in Japanese. Mr. Iida is currently a special lecturer at the University of Yamaguchi.

Panel on Rape features Laura X

Laura X, Director of the National Clearinghouse on Marital and Date Rape in Berkley, California, presented a program on Date and Marital Rape on Monday, Sept. 21, at 11 a.m. in the Campus Center. She has spoken extensively throughout America during the past 18 years.

Heading the program was a panel including Laura X; Trish Murphy, Contact Peninsula Volunteer worker; Susan Wakefield, student auditor of the SGA and Sergeant Brenda Gesselman of the Campus Police.

According to a program sheet, the "X" of Laura X, symbolizes the anonymity of women's history and the legal ownership of women. The program began with a video clip of a debate between Laura X and an attorney that appeared on "60 Minutes", the CBS program.

Laura X did not watch the video because she said that she becomes too upset by the comments of the attorney in the video. During the video there

were approximately 14 students seated at the program with several others scattered around the Campus Center.

By the end of the video there were only ten students and two faculty members watching the program.

Laura X continued the program by trying to express the seriousness of the problems of date and marital rape.

"Rape does work, the purpose is to really humiliate and hurt someone to the point that they believe that they are at fault," said Laura X. She also said that marital rape is a new concept according to the law, and only recently has Virginia law removed the notion that sex is always allowed in a marriage.

She said that it follows the idea of date rape, and a girl owing her date sex has been a popular thought.

Gesselman said, "If anyone is sexually assaulted in any way to report it immediately--you do not owe anyone anything"

Gesselman also said, "we have had one case of rape [at Christopher Newport] in 1984, but none since and have not focused on it as a problem."

In fact, his cumulative GPA stands at 4.0, an impressive accomplishment. Ironically, Vaughan did not originally qualify for the Honors Program. John graduated from Menchville High School in 1989 with high honors, but his SAT scores were below those established by the Honors Council.

After a review of his transcripts, however, he was admitted to the program and went on to receive a Styron Scholarship as a freshman and the Greene Scholarship as a sophomore, before being awarded the Beamer scholarship, a full-tuition award established by Karl E. and Elizabeth H. Beamer to recognize "excellence in and commitment to" the study of science and mathematics.

Vaughan is also an active member of CNU's Baptist Student Union. The best part of being a member of BSU is "being involved with people you know you can count on-it's like a family in itself," he said. "My parents always taught me to try to be a friend to everybody, and the members of BSU look out for each other."

For relaxation, he enjoys getting out and staying active, especially by playing tennis and basketball. Although he laughs, "What spare time?" he tries to find time to catch the Captains in action. "When Lamont Strothers [now playing for the Portland Trailblazers] was here, I went regularly," he said.

Inaddition to keeping busy at school, Vaughan also works part-time. Summer work experience includes six seasons at Bush Gardens and an internship in the Shipyard Treatment Room Clinic.

This semester he is working parttime in the Biology Department as a laboratory assistant. For the past two years he has also volunteered at the Virginia Living Museum, but this semester his schedule is too heavy to permit him to continue.

After receiving his master's degree, he hopes to go into research and perhaps teach at the college level. "I think I'm determined, but not overly ambitious," he said. "I know where I want to be and what I have to do to get there.

But overall, the most important thing is that I'm content. Money is not the most important goal, happiness is-or at least it should be."

dependents. When the policy was changed this summer, 150 military dependents immediately withdrew due to the higher tuition, and many students who would have applied did not.

McLoughland says, "it's cheaper to go to Hampton University [a private institution]ifyou are part of a military family, and not a state resident, than it is to go to CNU."

Currently, CNU recruits students at local high schools, military bases and the Newport News Shippard. However, with the construction of residence halls, Christopher Newport's recruiting will expand "up and down the eastern seaboard from Boston to Charleston," says McLoughland. A new, picture-filled publication is also

was to make sure students did not have to sign the student evaluations.

Now, students who want input on a tenured professor's fall performance will have to go to the chairman of the department to "voice concerns, and of course, then students will be known," states O'Neil.

"If you have a complaint that is sufficiently serious, you ought to be willing to go to the chairman," Dr. Webb explained.

Dr. Webb also assures that if students are "clear about what constitutes a decent grievance and have a legitimate academic basis, they are paid attention to."

in the works to introduce CNU to a broader area.

He explained that recruiting will be emphasized in the greater metropolitan, Washington D.C. area, Richmond and Fredericksburg with high school juniors being the focus. "The admissions office receives slightly more that 1000 requests per year for dormitory information, especially from northern Virginia." The anticipated dorm construction will provide housing for 433 students, and though some currently enrolled students may live there, it is expected that the majority of occupants will be incoming freshmen and exchange students. McLoughland notes, "that's a significant difference."

McLoughland anticipates that the number of enrolled students at CNU will increase. He adds, "CNU is still among the best education bargains in the area."

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
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
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Soccer ends streak of Mary Washington defeats

1. Management downsizing and diversification. Many recruiters now have additional duties and cannot afford to spend an entire day conducting on-campus interviews.

2. A sluggish economy which generates expectations of fewer job vacancies.

Anumber of employers we contacted have requested that, in lieu of oncampus interviewing, we forward resumes of students enrolled or graduated in specific areas. If you have not established your placement file in the OCCS, you may already be missing out on significant employment opportunities!




