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### Payment to Vendors

The following letter was recently received from the Comptroller of Commonwealth of Virginia regarding payment to vendors.

"Recently, the Department of Accounts has received complaints from vendors with regard to unpaid invoices. In addition, concern has been expressed by members of the General Assembly that agencies are not paying obligations in a timely fashion. Some vendors have threatened to stop dealing with State agencies because they cannot afford to tie up their capital. If we lose these low biddings vendors, it could increase costs to your agency and to the State as a whole. Good management dictates that we pay our bills on time and in the correct amount.

Please review your internal procedures to insure that there are no unnecessary steps in the process and that your people perform their tasks without delay."

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### Procedural Changes in Transfer Credit Evaluations

In response to suggestions from several faculty members we will make the following changes, effective immediately on all transfer credit evaluation forms:

1. Where transfer credit fully satisfies the English, Humanities, Natural Science, Modern & Foreign Language, and/or P.E. activity distribution requirements, the CNC equivalent on the evaluation form will always read "Satisfies \_\_\_\_\_ Distribution Requirement."
2. In those instances where 12 hours of Social Science work are needed to satisfy that requirement a transfer sequence, such as Psychology 201-202, will appear on the evaluation form as "Satisfies 1/2 Social Science Distribution Requirement," A single course, such as General Psychology will still appear as "Psych. 201" on the evaluation.



3. Certain common first-year mathematics courses have no CNC equivalent but can be used to satisfy part of that distribution requirement (e.g., Trigonometry). In such instances the evaluation form will read "Satisfies 1/2 Math Distribution Requirement."
4. Transfer courses for which CNC has no equivalent department (e.g., Meteorology) will now simply read as "Elective" (upper or lower level) on the evaluation form. No attempt will be made to assign an area of learning to such courses. Where an appropriate department does exist, that department will be identified with the elective (e.g., U.Va.'s "History of Mathematics" will read on our evaluation form as "upper-level Mathematics Elective").

We hope these changes will improve the use of these forms for all faculty advisers. Any other suggestions would be welcome.

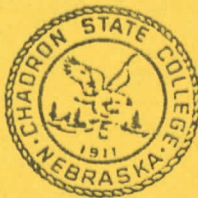
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Faculty/Staff News
