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POSITION OPENING

Dean of Student Affairs

Christopher Newport College seeks applicants for the position of Dean of Student Affairs. The dean has overall responsibility for the student personnel services of the College, including student activities, counseling, financial aid and placement services. The dean reports directly to the president.

CNC is a state-supported, 4-year college located in suburban Tidewater Virginia. It is non-residential, and serves almost 4,000 full- and part-time students both on its main campus and at several off-campus locations. The student body is composed of both traditional and non-traditional students, including large numbers of adults, military personnel and veterans.

Applicants are required to hold an earned doctorate and to have had a minimum of 4 years experience in student personnel services or related position. The position carries a 12-month contract and is now available. Salary: \$23,000 - \$26,000 depending on qualifications and experience. Resumes, 3 letters of reference, transcripts, and other appropriate materials, including a statement giving an approach to the demands of the position, must be postmarked by June 9.

ADMISSIONS OFFICE

We are happy to report that, as of May 1, Classified (degree-seeking) applicants are running approximately 7% ahead of last year at the same time. If this trend continues some 480 new freshmen and 550 new transfer students will enter the College this fall. We are also anticipating 950-1000 new unclassified students, for a potential maximum of 2,030 new students on campus in September. If normal attrition patterns persist we should have a total headcount enrollment of 4,000 students this fall. Applicant data are as follows:

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Faculty Advisory Committee

Undergraduate Student Cross-Registration

The purpose of undergraduate cross-registration is to provide opportunities for enriched educational programs by permitting students at any of the nine Virginia Tidewater Consortium (VTC) institutions to take courses at any other VTC institution.

Policies:

1. Students at any resident VTC institution may register on a credit or audit basis for courses offered by other VTC institutions with the approval of the HOME institution.
2. When a student enrolled at one VTC HOME institution cross-registers to a VTC HOST school, the credit earned will be treated by the HOME institution as if earned at the HOME institution and will be so posted on the student's transcript as resident credit. A VTC institution will not issue a transcript to a cross-registered student which it hosts.
3. The grading system of the HOME institution must be used by the instructor at the HOST institution.
4. Tuition will be charged by the HOME institution for a cross-registered course. The cross-registrant must assume costs of all transportation, books, materials, lab fees, applied music fees etc.
5. Normally, the desired course must not be currently available at the student's HOME institution.
6. This policy applies only to regular on-campus credit courses of VTC institutions.
7. Students will be governed by the administrative rules and regulations of the HOST institution while in attendance there.
8. A VTC Cross-Registration Form must be completed and signed by the appropriate people at the HOST and HOME institution. Where necessary, the student will certify that he/she has met course prerequisites.
9. Each HOST institution will establish its own dates for cross-registration.
10. Each member institution shall set up its own procedures for implementing these broad policies.
11. The FTE credit will go to the HOST institution.
12. The cross-registration program will be closely monitored to assess trends in cross-registration and to assess any imbalance that may occur.

CNC Procedures for Cross-Registration

1. A CNC student participating in cross-registration:
 - A. must be a declared degree-seeking major with a cumulative quality point average of 2.0 or above. This QPA includes all transfer credits.
 - B. may register only for courses unavailable at CNC during the current or subsequent regular semester.
 - C. may cross-register during the regular fall and spring semesters only.
 - D. may register for a maximum of nine semester credit hours. Cross-registered courses are considered to be general elective. Upon the recommendation of the student's adviser, the chairman of the appropriate department may make an exception to the elective designation when departmental requirements are concerned.
 - E. will initiate the cross-registration process in the Registrar's Office at CNC.
2. Students from other institutions participating in Cross-Registration at CNC:
 - A. must be declared degree-seeking majors with a cumulative quality point average of 2.0 or above.
 - B. will register on a date specified for cross-registration at CNC.
 - C. may cross register for lower-level courses only IF they are students in an ASSOCIATE degree program.
3. Administrative Procedures
 - A. When grade conversions are made between the HOST institution and CNC, the

- CNC Registrar will monitor these conversions.
- B. Courses taken by CNC students under cross-registration will be designated by the appropriate CNC course number, course name, and the designation "VTC/HOST" on the transcript. Courses for which there is no equivalent at CNC will be designated as 1, 2, 3 or 4XX, the course name and "VTC/HOST" on the transcript. (If the computer can not handle the XX designation, we could use topics numbers, 1, 2, 3, 495.)

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Report of the Curriculum Committee

At its May 10 meeting the Committee voted to recommend the following to the Faculty.

French 306: Facets of a Changing France (3-3-0) Prerequisite: French 202.

The focus of the classroom work will be conversational. Newspapers, magazines, and films will be used to present the various facets of change in contemporary France and will serve as the basis for discussions. The primary goal of French 306 will be to improve the student's ability to express himself in a loosely-structured context on topics of current import. Techniques will include reports, group discussions, and interview situations.

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Degrees Committee - Meeting, May 3, 1978

The Committee recommends approval of the following petitions:

- I. Case #1: Student petitioned to substitute a non-sequence humanities combination to meet the distribution requirement. The first semester of a sequence has been completed: It is impossible for the student to schedule the necessary course to complete the sequence prior to graduation in January 1979.

The chairman of the major department recommends approval.

Case #2: Student petitioned for an exemption from the English 102 requirement. English 101, 205, and 341 were transferred from William & Mary.

The chairman of the English Department recommends approval based upon research papers presented.

Case #3: Student petitioned to substitute a non-sequence humanities combination (English 341 and English 395 - American Short Story) in order to complete degree requirements in August 1978. The English 341 course was transferred to CNC.

The chairman of the English Department recommends approval.
