Economics Professor to Speak on Welfare Reform

RICHMOND, VA. -- Dr. Carolyn Shaw Bell, the Katharine Coman Professor of Economics at Wellesley College, will be speaking at five Virginia colleges and universities this week under the auspices of the University Center in Virginia on "Welfare Reform -- For Whom?". Before joining the faculty at Wellesley, she taught at Holyoke Junior College. She has also served as an economist in the Office of Price Administration, a research economist for the Social Science Research Council at Harvard University, and an economic consultant to publishers and to consumer marketing firms. She has done extensive studies on employment and on problems of the urban poor.


Carolyn Shaw Bell is Katharine Coman Professor of Economics at Wellesley College. Mrs. Bell's special fields are the economics of consumption and marketing, and economic accounting. She has done extensive studies on employment, on problems of the urban poor, and currently chairs the Committee on the Status of Women in the Economics Profession of American Economic Association.

A member of Phi Beta Kappa, Mrs. Bell received her undergraduate degree from Mount Holyoke College and the Ph.D. degree from the London School of Economics.

Before joining the faculty at Wellesley, she taught at Holyoke Junior College. She served as an economist in the Office of Price Administration during World War II, has been a research economist for the Social Science Research Council at Harvard University, and an economic consultant to publishers and to consumer marketing firms.

Mrs. Bell has held the Shirley Farr Fellowship from the American Association of University Women for research on consumer innovation, and Ford Foundation grants for research on economic education in the schools.

She is the author of many articles. Her

"Unemployed Women: Do They Matter?" which appeared in the Wall Street Journal (March 15, 1972) has been widely quoted and reprinted. More recent articles include: "Social Security: Society's Last Discrimination" (Business and Society Review, Autumn 1972), and "Age, Sex, Marriage and Jobs" (The Public Interest, Winter 1972-1973). Mrs. Bell's monograph "Women in Science: Definitions and Data for Economic Analysis" appears in Annuals of the New York Academy of Science, Vol. 208 (1973). Two pieces dealing with problems of the urban poor are scheduled for publication in the forthcoming issue of Current

History and The Journal of Economic Issues Currently in press is a chapter in a collection of essays, entitled Public Service Employment to be published by Praeger in May. Mrs. Bell's

most recent full-length work is The Economics of the Ghetto, a Pegasus book, published in both hardcover and paperback by Bobbs-Merrill. Earlier books dealt with the fields of consumption and marketing.

Outside the College, she serves on the Board of Economic Advisers for the Public Interest Center; the Committee on Hiring Practices of the American Economic Association, and is a 1973 member of the AEA's nominating committee; the Board of Directors of the Association for Evolutionary Economics; the editorial board of Challenge magazine; and she is a public member of the National Advertising Review Board (NARB), the advertising industry's self-regulatory body.

Mrs. Bell is widely known as a professional economist because of her frequent commentaries on current economic problems in the press, at conferences, and on the air. Her criticism of administration policy on unemployment helped produce a change in the official reports issued monthly from the White House.

Dr. Bell will speak here on Monday, November 10 at 12 noon in the Campus Center Theatre. Her address should be of special interest to economic and business majors; however, this lecture will be open to all members of the student body and faculty. Her topic will be, "Welfare Reform -- For Whom?".



William Walker made his Metropolitan debut in 1962 after being top winner in the Met Auditions. Since then he has sung leading roles there and on the company's national tours ranging from Papageno in Mozart's "Magic Flute" to Prince Yeletsky in Tchaikovsky's "Queen of Spades" (Pique Dame). On Broadway he has starred as Lucille Ball's leading man in "Wildcat" and has appeared in Continuing Studies, 599-7045.



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



Everyone who has followed the Beatles through the years has probably picked a favorite. Each individual style that was put under restraint in the group format has now come to light. George Harrison has developed and presented his own unique sound in this manner.

Harrison has caught a lot of flak for promoting his style; people wanted the Beatle sound back. Consequently, Harrison's solo work was thought to be "alright," but "not the Beatles." George has spent years, and many albums proving that his sound is just as worthwhile.

Extra Texture is his latest release. Many of Harrison's standby musicians appear on this album such as: Jim Horn, Leon Russell, Billy Preston, Klaus Voorman, Jim Keltner, and a long list of others. George has always incorporated a variety of talents in his albums which he seemingly dominates.

"You" is the AM hit of the LP that features the unusual addition of a string arrangement to a rock format. "Yakkety Sax", a sound popular with the other three ex-Beatles, is featured.

The now famous Harrison weeping guitar style is the foundation for "This Guitar Can't Keep from Crying." The guitar blends with the synthesizing of the ARP bass beautifully.

"OOh Baby (You Know that I Love You)" resembles "Light That Has Lighted the World"

off of Living in the Material World. This sleepy, easy-going number is dedicated to Smokey Robinson. Its only bad feature is the obscurity of the vocals.

The one song that is reminiscent of the Beatles is "World of Stone," only because a multi-tracked vocal "chorus" is used.

Finally, the rocker, "His Name Is Legs (Ladies and Gentlemen)" has Harrison's characteristic galloping rhythm, similar to the title cut off Living in the Material World. The brass is strong in this number; Billy Preston plays piano.

Extra Texture marks the last of the Apple Records for George Harrison; ironically, he also had the first record on the Apple label. The recording crew and the producer have changed. All of the old Apple people have been removed and Harrison produced his own album.

Although the development of George Harrison's sound was naturally influenced by his Beatle background, it remains unique and laudable in its own right.





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SGA Not Dead, Attendance Record Set at Assembly Meeting

Yes, Christopher Newport, the SGA is still alive, even though they don't seem to be too visible. There were thirty people in attendance at the SGA Assembly meeting on October 27, quite possibly a record for this college.

What is the Assembly doing? Monday's meeting was called to order by the Speaker of the assembly, Eric Bankit- I bet you did not know he was the Speaker! After the minutes were read the Assembly elected Chuck Edwards as Vice-Speaker, Paul Clements was appointed as Parliamentarian, and Wanda Moen was elected to be the Secretary.

The next order of business was to untable some amendments, the first of which was to change the name of the Student Assembly to the Student Senate so that student representatives may be called Senators and carry more weight around the school, and with the Administration.

Typical of past Assemblies, the present body of student representatives spent almost an entire hour discussing amendments to the By-Laws, which must become obsolete from semester to semester with all the changes that are made.

After the October 27 meeting, class vice-presidents are ex-officio members of the Senate presidents are ex-officio members of the Senate, with a vote. A proposal was made that the SGA vice-president serve as historian; compiling data, minutes, and committee reports. It was also proposed to have the Vice-president serve as Parliamentarian for the SGA Executive Council and to have the Treasurer of the SGA issue a financial statement each semester to the Student Activities Committee, SGA, and to clubs or interested groups recognized by the SGA and funded by the Student Activities Committee.

Reaffirming the main purpose of the student government to do things for the student, campus, and the school; three committees were appointed. Two of the committees were set up to review the Financial Aid office and the Student Placement office. The third committee, whose results will hopefully be published, is a committee to conduct class and faculty evaluations.

Following this important business the German Club's constitution was presented to the Senate, which requested that it be returned for minor revisions.

Before adjourning for the day, all veterans were saluted, in honor of the day-Veteran's Day.

The next meeting of the SGA Assembly is scheduled for Monday, November 10 at noon in CC 233. All students have the right to attend these meetings.



Questions and Answers About Benefits

Q. What is this delimiting date I see on VA correspondence?

A. This is the date that your eligibility for VA educational assistance will cease. Under the present law you have 10 years from the date of your last release from active duty. Exception has been made for those veterans released from active duty prior to June 1, 1966. Their eligibility will expire May 31, 1976.

Q. What happens if my 36 months entitlement ends in the middle of a semester?

A. For veterans, entitlement will be extended to the end of the semester provided the delimiting date has not passed.

Q. How does the Vocational Rehabilitation program differ from the regular G.I. Bill?

A. This is a program to assist a service


disabled veteran to acquire new vocational skills to help overcome the handicap of his disability. The VA pays the trainee a monthly allowance, and pays the cost of his tuition, books, supplies and any other incidental services. Normally, eligibility for this program is based on service-connected disability of 10% or more. 
