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Personal Property of Employees

Recently, there have been many inquiries regarding whether the state provides insurance coverage on the personal property of employees. It appears many employees use their own books, computers, tools, etc. on the job. This memo should provide the necessary clarification.

Personal property used in the course of employment will not be covered by the Commonwealth's Property Insurance Program, unless the property is specifically included in the employment agreement. For example, a personal computer is stolen from an employee's office. There will only be coverage provided if, as a written condition of employment, the employee is required to provide his own personal computer.

Also, it should be noted, personal property in housing supplied by the Commonwealth will not be covered by the Commonwealth's Property Insurance Program. For those employees, such as College Professors, Wardens, etc., we would recommend that they obtain a tenant-homeowners policy to cover their personal possessions.

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Roland Enters Maccabiah Games

Christopher Newport College soccer coach Seth Roland will be making his third trip to the 12th Maccabiah Games in Israel this month.

His last appearance in the Maccabiah Games was in 1981. And before that it was in 1977.

"In '81, we came back with a silver medal," said Roland, in his third year as coach at CNC. "It was the first time in which an American team won any kind of a medal in soccer."

And what is in store for Roland and his Jewish American team this time around?

"We're not the favorite...Israel has the team to beat," said Roland. "However, if things break right for us in the draw, we should do pretty good."

Joining Roland on the U.S. team will be William and Mary soccer coach Al Albert and one of his players, Andy Smolin.

Like Roland, Albert has appeared before in the Maccabiah Games. The W&M skipper coached the U.S. team in 1981.

"We got a good draw in '81 and played awfully well ... things seemed to break just right for us," said Albert, who is entering his 16th season as head soccer coach at W&M. "Israel appears to have the best team. Most of their team is comprised of their World Cup 'B' team and other great players.

Roland, Albert and Smolin left for Rutgers University last week to train with the rest of the members of the U.S. team before leaving for Tel Aviv July 10. The Games will run from July 15-25.

"Some of the top Jewish American soccer players in the country will be at Rutgers," said Roland, who had to go to two tryout camps before making the final team. "We had over 300 turn out for the tryouts before an 18-man team was picked."

According to Albert, Roland will be a mid-fielder for the U.S. team. "That's where I believe Seth can give us the most help," said Albert. "As for Smolin, he'll probably play up front somewhere."

Roland had two of his greatest thrills ever during the '81 games. "I finished as the team's high scorer with four goals, and we defeated Great Britain, 4-1," recalled the CNC coach. "I was also selected to lead the U.S. team in the closing ceremonies of the Maccabiah Games at Ramat Gan Stadium. We marched through the streets of Jerusalem. It was a very moving experience."

In all, some 18 countries will be represented in the soccer shootout. In addition to Israel and the U.S., others represented in the soccer playoffs include Great Britain, South Africa, Argentina, Western Germany, Brazil and Peru.

The U.S. soccer contingent will open with a game against Columbia. Denmark and Italy are also in the group.

"I recall in '81 we had to play seven games in eight days," said Roland, whose CNC Captains were 3-11-1 and 11-7-1 the last two years. "It's extremely hot over there at this time. We're going to have to be in tip-top physical condition to play well in that kind of heat.

Playing international rules, the teams are only allowed to two substitutions. "You can't substitute freely as we do in the college ranks, and that's demanding on everyone in a 90-minute game," said Roland.

While Roland and Albert did say they were a "bit concerned" over the recent hijacking of a TWA jet in that area of the world, they did not have any second thoughts about making the trip.

"We're flying over with EL-AL, and they have real tight security," said Roland. "Our luggage will be checked three to four times before we leave the ground."
