OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Holiday Leave

The College will observe the following holiday schedule during the Fall Semester:

Labor Day - The College will be closed on Labor Day, September 5, 1988. This is an authorized holiday, and annual leave is not charged. Classes will meet but all offices will be closed.

Thanksgiving - The College will be closed on Thanksgiving Day, November 24, and on Friday, November 25, 1988. Both days are authorized holidays and annual leave is not charged.

Christmas and New Year's Day - The College will close at 12:00 noon on December 23, 1988, and remain closed until 8:00 a.m., January 3, 1989. All of these days are authorized holidays with the exception of December 23, 1988. Traditionally, Governors have authorized State government offices to be closed for one-half day for observance of Christmas Eve. Taking this practice into consideration, one-half day will be observed as Christmas Eve on December 23. If the Governor does not authorize the additional four hours of Christmas leave, four hours of annual leave will be charged for the afternoon of December 23, 1988.

Employees required for necessary services on the above holidays are eligible for compensatory leave.

Call for Papers: "The Treaty of Versailles: The Shaping of the Modern World"

Virginia Humanities Conference Annual Meeting April 7-8, 1989
Mary Baldwin College, Staunton, VA

The annual meeting of the Virginia Humanities Conference will be held on the campus of Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, VA, on April 7 and 8, 1989. The 1989 meeting will be co-sponsored by the Woodrow Wilson Birthplace Foundation. The meeting theme will be "The Treaty of Versailles: The Shaping of the Modern World." Papers should have a 20-minute reading time, leaving opportunity for discussion. All accepted papers will be published in the Proceedings of the Meeting.

Proposals for papers are solicited in the following four categories. (Specific paper topics are suggestions only; papers on any topic which falls within one of the four categories are solicited.)

The Political Aftermath of the War: Nationalism and Internationalism; the Rise of Facism, Communism, Japanese Imperialism; the Role of America on the World Scene; Europe After the War

Society in the Post-War Period: Women's Rights (The Suffragette Movement Before and After World War I); Racism in the 1920s, Class and Generational Conflict as a Post-War Phenomenon

The Cultural Response: Modernism and Post-Modernism; the Post-War Ethos in Art and Literature; Jazz and the Post-War Generation; Philosophy Before and After the War

The Treaty: Its Background and Consequences: The Wilson Heritage; Political and Philosophical Background of the 14 Points; The League of Nations and the United Nations; The Treaty 60 Years Later

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Wendell Barbour presented the summary address for "Copyright Is Still With Us: Reviving Issues of the 1978 Copyright Law and Issues Posed by New Technologies" at the American Library Association's Summer Conference in New Orleans on July 11, 1988. The panel presentation addressed the copyright issues of photocopying, interlibrary loan, videotaping and software copying and licensure. The presentation was sponsored by the Copyright Committee of the Association of College and Research Libraries.

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Deborah Fontaine and Susan Casey attended the 1988 American Marketing Association Faculty Consortium. The meeting was held at VPI&SU in Blacksburg, VA. from July 24-27. The focus was distribution, transportation and logistics.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Minutes of the April 22 Faculty Meeting

Although the meeting was to begin at 3:00, by 3:26 there were still six fewer persons present than the number needed for a quorum.

Professor Fellowes moved that the rules be suspended concerning the quorum and that we meet anyway, indicating our lack of numbers to the president. Since there was not a quorum to vote on this motion, all actions taken below are unofficial.

I. The minutes of the meetings of 3/4/88 and 3/10/88 were approved as written.

- E. Faculty Advisory Committee - Dr. Healey announced that the faculty Senate had been elected and that its first meeting would be 3/25/88. He also reminded the faculty that the FAC will no longer exist and that a meeting to mourn its passing would be held 4/29/88 at The Terrace.
- F. Nominations Committee - Professor Weber thought that there was some confusion as to how faculty got on committees. He reminded the group that all faculty are eligible, although service on some committees precludes service on others. Some committee assignments are made by the VPAA or the Deans. Faculty interested in those assignments should contact the VPAA or the appropriate dean. Other committee slots are filled by elections in each of the schools. The Nominating Committee suggests names for the remaining slots. Faculty interested in these slots should send a memo to the Nominating Committee.

III. Professor L. Morgan moved the approval of the list of degree candidates for May 1988. The motion was seconded. Professor Cones offered an amendment to add the name of Robert Shohan, B.S. in Biology, to the list. The amendment was seconded and approved. The amended motion was approved.

Professor Weber moved the approval of the revision to the interdisciplinary studies program as presented on pages 15-17 of the Curriculum Committee's report to the faculty which was attached to the Chronicle of April 15, 1988. The motion was seconded and passed.

Professor Weber moved the acceptance of the revised teacher education program as listed on pages 2-9 of the Curriculum Committee's report. The motion was seconded and passed.

VI. Announcements

Professor Morris announced that the faculty chosen to speak in the Dean's Colloquium next year are Professors Mazzarella, Rosenberg and Weiss.


Professor Fellowes announced the retirement of Professor Shaver.

VPAA Summerville announced that two of the four proposals submitted by CNC faculty for grants from the State Funds for Excellence were accepted. CNC will receive \$160,000 - \$165,000 to study "Advisement as Acculturation" (Dean Powell) and "Critical Thinking across the Curriculum" (Professor Hoaglund). VPAA Summerville congratulated the people involved in the preparation of these proposals especially to the Grants Officer, W. Barbour.

The VPAA also announced the funding of a project through Title III monies: "Peninsula Institute for Teachers of Mathematics" (Professors Friedman and Gailey).

VII. The meeting was adjourned at 4:45.
