Members of the Christopher Newport College faculty have presented papers, attended conferences and won numerous awards during the spring 1990 semester:

Dr. Charles Wilson of the English department presented a paper at a recent Dean William Parks Memorial Colloquia, and Professor Elizabeth Jones, of the department of

modern languages and classical studies, gave a lecture tour.

Guzin Armagan and Dr. Martin Buoncristiani delivered a paper co-authored by Chris Edwards at the Advanced Solid State Laser Conference in Utah, and art instructor Betty Anglin had a painting selected for the 30th Irene Leache Memorial Exhibition to be held at the Chrysler

er Museum and won the Woodhouse Electric Company Watercolor Award in the Annual Juried Miniature Exhibition at the Heritage Foundation Museum in Norfolk.

Jalane Kennedy of Career Planning and Placement made two presentations for the National Association of Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors (NAWDAC) in Nashville, while Harold Cones of the science department was selected as 'Dr. Earth' by WWDE-FM as their ambassador for Earth Day.

Philosophy professor Dr. John Hoaglund lectured at the Center for Reasoning Arts at California State University in Sacramento, led a colloquium at San Jose State University, and read a paper at the annual conference of the American Society for Aesthetics in Pacific Grove, Calif.

Dr. Lora Friedman, chair of the education department, made a presentation at the annual conference of the Virginia Education Computing Conference in Charlottesville; Dr. Archie W. Earl Sr., professor of mathematics, presented a paper at the Seventh International Conference on Technology and Education in Brussels, Belgium; and Wendell Barbour, director of the Smith Library, has been asked to serve on the steering committee for the Governor's Conference on Library and Information Services.

Dr. Linda Morgan and Professor John Jenkins made a presentation at the annual conference of the Virginia Middle School Association in Charlottesville. Shigeto Kaka, assistant professor of economics and finance, presented a joint paper with Dr. Brough, Office of Management and Budget, Washington, D.C., at the annual meeting of the Public Choice Society and Economic Science Association in Tucson, Ariz.

Dr. Charles G. Hurst, Dr. Sang O. Park and Professor Deborah Fontaine reviewed and evaluated the Geo-Facilities Information System (GFIS) plan that is now being considered for implementation by the Department of Public Utilities (Waterworks) for the City of Newport News, while Dr. John Anderson and Professor Carl Colonna viewed and critiqued a draft of the Economic Framework for the Future for Paul F. Miller, director of the Department of Planning and Development for the City of Newport News.

Dr. Dick Guthrie of the department of modern and classical languages and literature served as a judge in the forensics contest of the Virginia Organization of German Students at Denbigh High School in March; Dr. Rita Hubbard, department chair of arts and communication, had an article published in *Methods of Rhetorical Criticism: A 20th Cen-*

tury Perspective, and Capt. Dewey Patrick and Master Sgt. Rick Bynum were recently awarded the Army Achievement Medal for their performances as Platoon Tactical Officer and Platoon Noncommissioned Officer respectively at the 1989 ROTC Advance Summer Camp at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Professors Guzin Armagan and M. Buoncristiani and Professor B. DiBartolo of Boston College had two articles appear in the November issue of the *Journal of Luminescence*; Dr. Clyde Brockett, Falk Professor of Music, will attend the week-long seminar at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the department of modern and classical language and literature recently hosted the annual meeting of the Foreign Language Association of Virginia on campus.

Professor Lawrence Mills received the Small Business Administrator's Minority Advocated Award, and Jenilou Grotevant, assistant library director, presented a workshop session at the annual Not for Children Only book discussion day.

Carl Colonna has been named the Harrol A. Brauer Jr. Professor of Business for the 1990-1991 academic year, and Coach Vince Brown recently became the 14th person in CNC's history to receive a Distinguished Service Medal.

CNC PROFESSORS AWARDED \$1.3 MILLION IN RESEARCH GRANTS

Research being conducted on such diverse topics as "Spectroscopy of Tunable Solid State Laser Materials" and the U.S. Constitution has helped establish Christopher Newport College as a respected research institution.

Twenty-four members of the college's faculty received 26 research grants totaling more than \$1.3 million during the 1989-90 fiscal year, which ended June 30. The grants are for work in science, education, the arts and humanities.

"The research our professors are conducting has far-reaching implications," said CNC Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Richard M. Summerville. "Some of the things we're doing for NASA, for instance, may impact how we live in the 21st Century."

The grants enable CNC professors to purchase necessary research materials, collect and study data, publish their findings or conduct educational seminars.
