Please make the following changes to that section, which appears on page 27 of the catalog, bottom left ... The paragraph should read as follows:

#### Core Requirements

A total of forty-eight hours in computer science and mathematics



is required, including: CPSC 220, 221, 310, 320, 330, 340, 370, 410, and 420; MATH 125, 140, 235 (Or 260), and 240; and three of CPSC 450, 460, 470, 480, 495, MATH 380, MATH 480, (with CPSC 495 used no more than twice).

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#### PLATO Demonstration

Control Data Corporation has agreed to give the colleges of the Consortium a demonstration of their PLATO system. PLATO is a highly sophisticated computer-based



individualized education system which consists of a number of self-contained college level courses in such areas as Business Management, Computer and Data Processing, Economics, Education, Financial Management, Health Sciences, Foreign Languages, Math, Marketing, Physics, Psychology, Sociology and Statistics. This system should be of great interest to us since the Army is making use of it, and students completing the courses will probably some time in the future ask for credit or transfer into one of our institutions.

The demonstration of the PLATO system will take place on Thursday, April 28, 1983 at 10 am in Room 105 of the Administration Building, CNC. It is anticipated that the program will last about two hours. There will be sufficient opportunity to ask detailed questions about the system. All interested personnel are invited to attend. This demonstration may be beneficial to deans, department chairmen, members of the faculty and persons involved in nontraditional learning and evaluation. 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### Film Series

The Psychology Department at Christopher Newport College, which has sponsored this year a film series consisting of three of Ingmar Bergman's most provocative creations, will present "Through a Glass Darkly" on April 28th. The film will be shown in the Campus Center Theatre at 12:15 pm and 7:00 pm. Admission is \$2.00.

"Through a Glass Darkly" is a classic chronicle of the pathetic plunge of a young woman into mental illness. Karin, having read in her father's journal that she is an incurable schizophrenic, goes through a series of compulsive acts and visions into a world of hallucinations. This is a very powerful film in which the audience participates in the terror of Karin's experience.

"Bergman has charted with technical accuracy the moving psychological drama of a descent to insanity. A powerful, personal experience." -- New York Times.

Dr. James C. Windsor, Professor of Psychology, will introduce the film and lead a discussion following the presentation.
