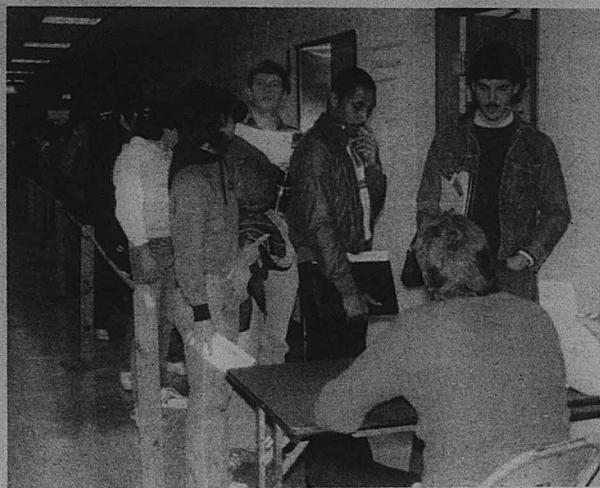


The Captain's Log

Christopher Newport College has experienced a healthy growth in student enrollment over the last few years.

During the Fall semester of 1981 there were 4,098 students enrolled at the college as opposed to the 4,398 that are currently registered. This is a 7 percent increase of students in less than two years.

The factors involved for such an increase, according to CNC Registrar Robert Netter, are good faculty members, and the locality of the college in a heavily-populated area.

He added that there is wider recognition throughout the community for CNC students and graduates. The future enrollment of the college is expected to continue increasing. Netter believes that "a short fall or leveling off [will not be] seen for some time."

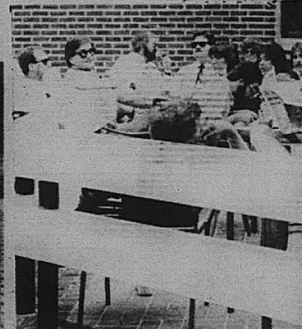

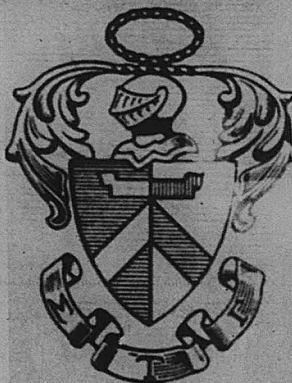

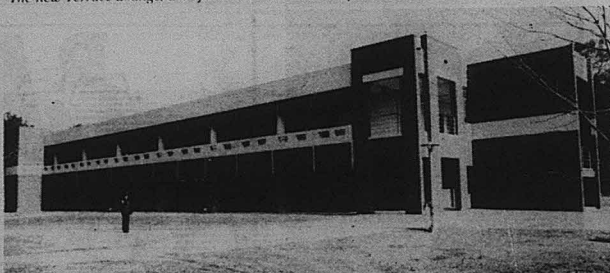

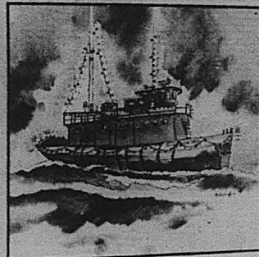

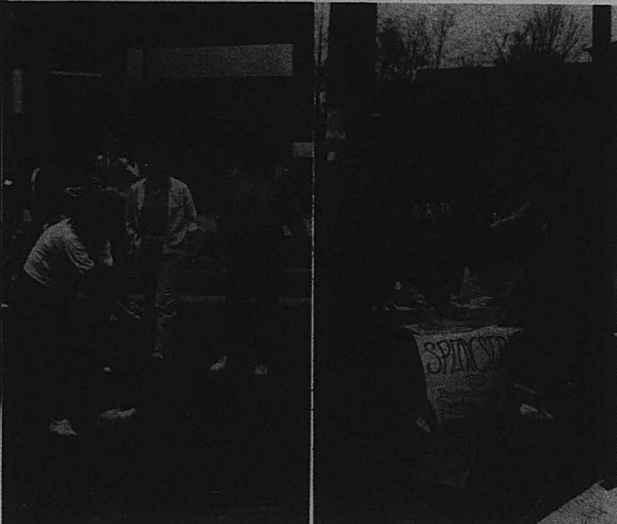

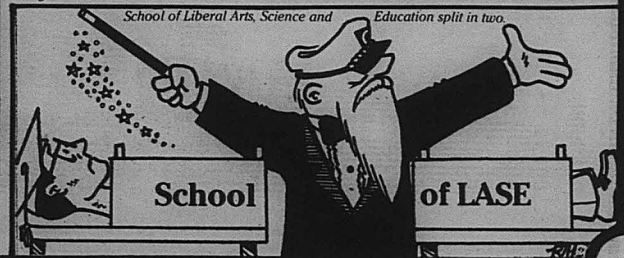

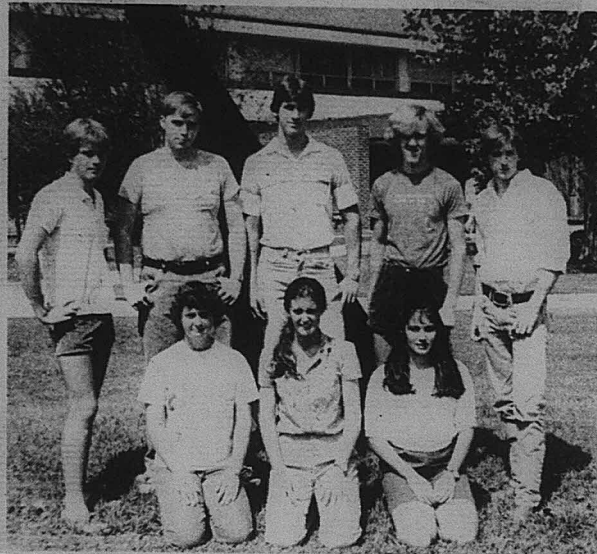

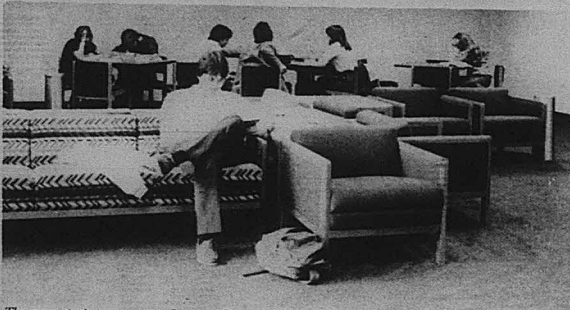

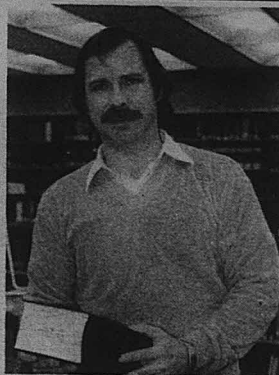

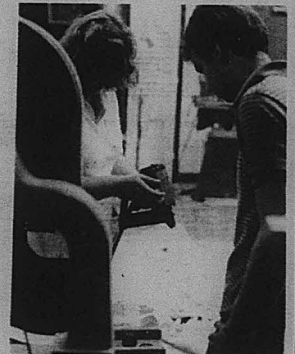

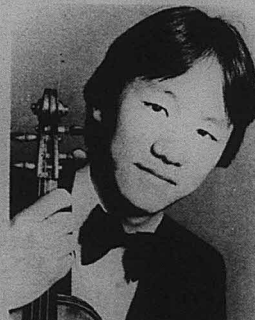

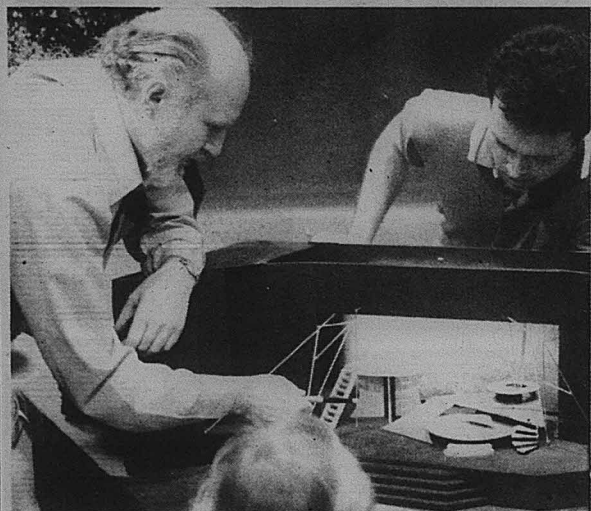

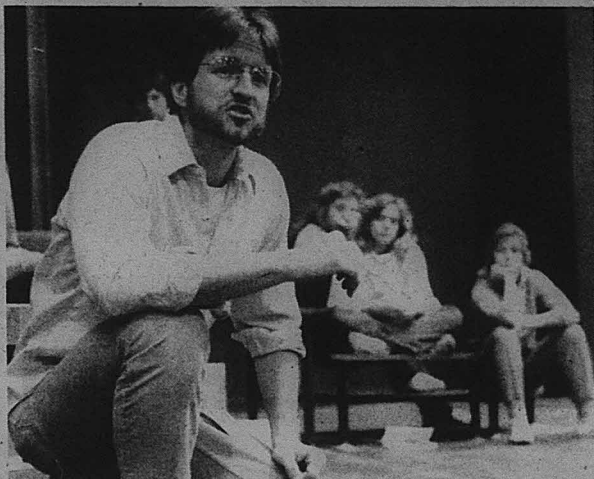

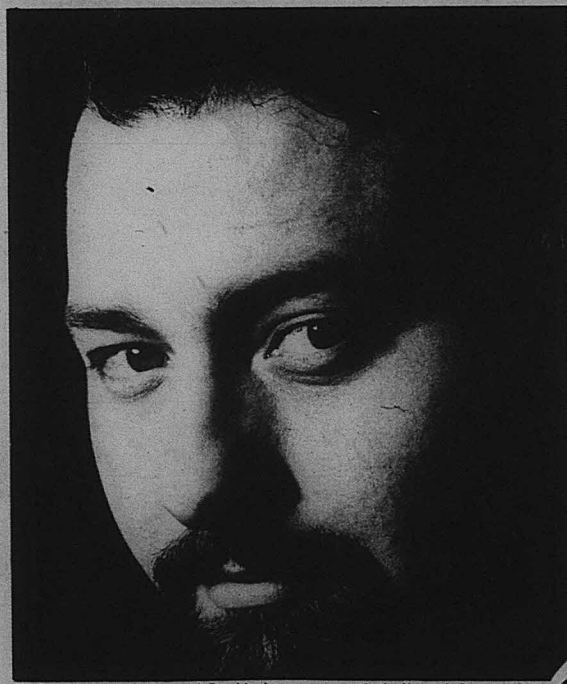

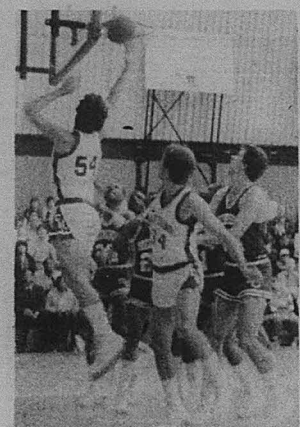

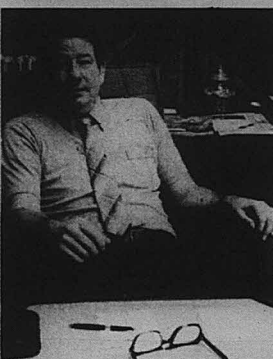

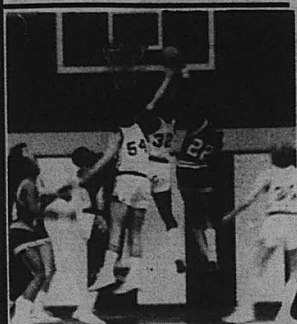

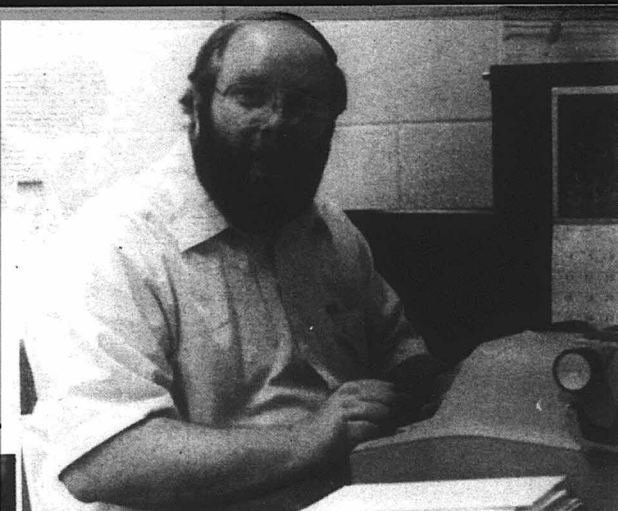
This Spring, a proposal to the CNC Board of Visitors suggested giving \$101,000 more to Athletics than 'last year.

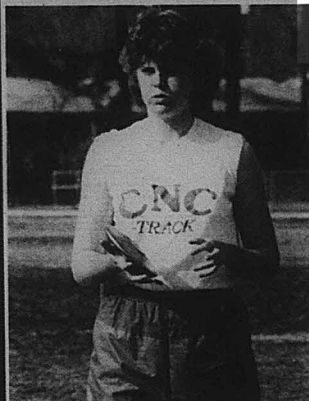
