#### FOSTER PARENTS ARE PEOPLE LIKE YOU

A lot of people think foster parents have to be very unusual. Actually, they are loving, stable folks who can provide a long term family living experience for children. Foster parents may be married, single or divorced and of any race or religion.

The Refugee Unaccompanied Minors Program is looking for people committed to helping a youth build a new life for him or herself. Foster families receive a monthly stipend and a youth's medical expenses are covered by Medicaid.

The youths in the program are Vietnamese or Amerasian and are typically between the ages of 13 and 17 when they arrive in this country. If you would like more information, please call us at 473-0352 (in Va. Beach). Volunteer tutors and big brothers or big sisters are also needed to work with individual youths.
