For more information, the History Club will hold a meeting on October 6 at 12:30 p.m. in Room 233 of the Campus Center.


Log seeks Sports writers

Bill Humphreys elected to office

Bill Humphreys was the big winner in the recent Student Association elections. He defeated Sharon Lantz and Dale Warden for the office of Student Association vice-president. The office has been vacant since Denise O'Connell resigned.

The actual voting figures were Humphreys, 311; Lantz, 192; and Warden, 119. The student turnout was heavier than in past elections with 635 students voting.

The other elections went as follows: senators elected are James Johnson, Fine Arts; William Henley, Business & Economics; Amy Hosevoll, Natural & Quantitative Sciences; Joe Elry, Social & Behavioral Sciences; and William Crosby, Education & Communications. The vice-president of Education & Communications is Sterling Brightman.

Legislation has been introduced in the Executive Council of the Student Association to abolish the Student Senate. When asked about the legislation, Humphreys said that he is getting student opinion about the Senate and that he wants to see the attendance at the Senate meeting. Wednesday before he makes up his mind on the subject.

Humphreys, a sophomore, thinks that part-time students should get more involved in activities at CNC. He says that participation in activities helps to round out an education. Humphreys is in favor of on-campus dormitories and more student activities.

Humphreys plans to get more input from the students on what they need or want done. To get this input, he wants to establish a town meeting sort of program, during the day and night, where the students can speak out.

SA and Grounds Committee clash

In response to student complaints stemming from inadequate parking, Student Association president Bill Bell has brought the problem to the attention of Skip Skillman, the director of buildings and grounds.

Bell charges that work which was performed on the lots near the Campus Center was done poorly and not according to the specified design.

In particular, Bell claims that preexisting white lines were not either properly removed or covered; the new white lines are wavy and inaccurate; parts of an island which was to be removed still exist; and a dead end still remains. In the second row of the parking lot near the island, directly opposite the gym's front doors, there was supposed to be a through fare. In fact, parking spaces now exist there.

"I realize that existing parking is not sufficient and that additional temporary parking is being added," says Bell. "My question is, will the errors which are causing numerous problems and confusion be corrected in the near future. If so, when?" he asks.

Skillman answers that "due to circumstances beyond my control, the summer work to the parking lots did not get started until very late..." However, he says, old white lines will be obliterated as

soon as possible; the island will be removed as soon as time permits and personnel can be scheduled; and the dead end by the gym will be corrected soon.

The wavy lines, Skillman contends, "are due mostly to having to paint after the cars were in place." He repudiates Bell's Continued on page 2

1978 will probably go down in recording history as the year of the gimmick record. Colored vinyl pressings and picture-discs have hit the market in numbers unheard of before. The term "limited edition" is thrown around so much that it's losing the magical aura it once endowed to a record.

Picture-discs are certainly the most revolutionary of the new novelties. They've been around for years, but only as promotional items for people within the music industry. This is the first

time that they've ever been marketed for public consumption.

Quite simply, a picture-disc is a reproduction of the album cover that is laminated between two layers of vinyl--a kind of record sandwich. Pressing of one of the LP's is a slow process that must be done by hand. All of this translates into a very expensive record.

The most readily available picture-discs are Heart's Magazine and the Beatles' Sqt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band.


Newman Club Revives Today

Student Body it could be as near as September 27, 1978, at approximately 12:15 p.m. This is the date and time of the next, and possibly last, assembly of the Christopher Newport College Student Senate. This body, whose responsibilities include riding herd on Bill Bell, S.A. President, and the Executive Committee, is in danger of losing its very life from this same Bill Bell and the Executive Committee. No, it's not a rock group. Bill Bell and the Executive Committee is the singularly most powerful group of students on our campus, outside of the Student Senate. If President Bell's time table is running true, he introduced legislation to the Executive Committee September 21st (last Thursday) that is intended, to quote the release from the Student Information Service which appeared in the September 19, 1978 edition of The Captain's Log, to "Liquidate the Student Senate."

There are only two things that can stop President Bell's bold move to power. The Executive Committee can vote him down, which doesn't look too likely, and the Senate itself can vote this piece of legislation totally out of existance. To do this, however, the Senate must meet and must have a majority (50% +1) present.

Who makes up the Senate? Last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday we elected Senators to fill vacancies in the Fine Arts, Business and Economics, Social and Behavioral Science, Natural and Quantitative Science, and Education and Communication Divisions. All together, there are six divisions with four senators and a vice-president from each division. That's 30 votes right there.

Add to these one senator from each Student Activities Committee recognized club or organization on campus, 33 more, and that gives you a grand total of 63 voting members in the Student Senate.

Are you a Senator? If so, please attend. Do you know anyone who is a Senator? If so, please bug them until they, too, attend. Has your club elected a Senator? If not please do it and have them at the Senate meeting!

We allowed Bill Bell to run unopposed for S.A. President. Can we also allow him the same privilege in closing down the Senate? I say no!





The Captains of Coach Bob Cummings edged Averett for a 2-0 Homecoming triumph that included a score when the losers accidentally kicked the ball through the host's goal.

Earlier in the week, CNC suffered a heart-breaking 1-0 loss to Hampden-Sydney for its fifth setback of the campaign.

The contest's only goal was registered

in the second half on a penalty shot by fullback Jim Babashak.

The much-improved Captains controlled the game's tempo, creating many scoring opportunities that proved fruitless.

Goalie Kenny Gagliardi and sweeper back Damian Decell paced a defense that has jelled tremendously since yielding 22 goals in its first four outings.

The freshman-dominated Captains' next home action is Sunday, Oct. 8 at 2 p.m. against the University of North Carolina-Greensboro.






turns are accepted, no matter what the defect might be.

There are other picture-discs available for other albums, but they're harder to get because such limited numbers are pressed. One disc, The Rocky Horror Picture Show Soundtrack, features a young lady from the movie on the record and is an eye catcher if for no other reason than the strategically placed spindle hole.

On the other side of the novelty coin we have the colored vinyl pressings. They've been commercially available before, but they seem to be enjoying a resurgence of popularity.

The most prominent of the new offerings is probably the Beatles' trilogy--the "White Album" on white vinyl, The Beatles 1962-1966 on red and The Beatles 1967 -1970 in translucent blue. Each album is a limited pressing of 150,000 copies, and they retail for around fifteen bucks. That isn't too bad since they're all double albums.

As far as sound qulaity on these records goes, there is some disagreement. Some say these are inferior to black vinyl; others say they are superior. I can't tell any difference. I do have a little trouble locating tracks on the White Album" because the bands are practically invisible.

Colored vinyl albums are easier to find than picture-discs. The first copies of the Rolling Stones' "Miss You" disco-45 were in pink. Butterfly Records, a disco label, has released most of their catalog on colored vinyl.

And that brings us to a question. How much is too much? At the rate things are going, black vinyl could be the rarity. Some of the labels are calling a pressing a "limited" edition without saying how limited. I mean, nobody is gonna' press an LP forever, so just about everything is "limited." Pretty soon the public will get fed up and the record companies will search for a new gimmick. How about a record that shows cartoons between songs?
