DEANS' ANNOUNCEMENTS

Funds for Faculty Development Grants

Contributions in the amount of \$801 designated for faculty development were received from the last Annual Fund Drive. The Board of Visitors has allocated an additional \$7,199 from unrestricted contributions for this purpose for a total of \$8,000. The \$7,199 represents approximately 30% of the unrestricted contributions and its allocation is indicative of the Board's strong support of the Faculty. An additional \$5,000 has also been set aside in the Academic Administration budget for faculty development grants.

The fall application period for development grants has been set for September 25-October 13. No applications received after October 13 will be considered. (See Faculty Advisory Committee Report in this issue of the Chronicle).

CNC Invites Internationally Known Speaker To Campus

Dr. Edgar A. Rose, Professor of Town and Country Planning at Manchester University in Manchester, England, will speak to students, faculty, and members of the community on Wednesday, September 27, at 12:00 noon, in G145. Dr. Rose will speak on "Criteria for Provisions of Housing for the Elderly," a study for which he has received a major research grant from the Nuffield Foundation.

In addition to teaching at Manchester University, Dr. Rose heads the Department of Architecture, Planning, and Urban Studies at the University of Aston in Birmingham, England. He is also a planning officer for the City of London and an external examiner for British Universities. His private architectural practice is in Manchester, England.

Dr. Rose's current publications include <u>British Town Planning</u>: <u>A Critical Profile</u> and "Monitor and Review of the Planning Process," which he delivered to the International Symposium on Planning in Tel Aviv, Israel. He is also involved in a joint housing research project with the University of Paris.

Dr. Rose is on a lecture tour throughout the country and has appeared at the University of Illinois, University of Akron, and will visit CNC after lecturing at Princeton University.


