



SCATS Service to Washington, D.C.

Virginia SCATS lines now make it possible to reach any number in the Metropolitan Washington, D.C.-Maryland calling area.

In order to place calls to the Washington-Maryland area use the following procedure:

--dial 8;
--dial 202; and
--dial the 7-digit telephone number in the Metropolitan Washington, D.C.-Maryland area. (Do not attempt to use the 301 area code to reach Maryland suburban telephone numbers. Use 202 for both D.C. and Maryland numbers.)

Agencies and institutions are expected to use SCATS lines instead of the more expensive long-distance circuits to reach the Metropolitan Washington numbers unless the SCATS facilities are busy for an unreasonable length of time.

The Virginia Public Telecommunications Center monitors monthly SCATS and long-distance bills and advises state agencies of abuses. SCATS calls should always be as brief as courtesy allows.

GRANTS & FELLOWSHIPS

Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy

The Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy accepts grant proposals from any non-profit organization, institution, or citizens group within Virginia. Twenty-three (23) grants have been awarded during the current 1975-76 grant year, a total of 44 grants in the past 18 months.

\$80,000 remains available for the period ending September 30, 1976, to support programs in the humanities on current public policy issues for adult community audiences. Workshops, conferences, seminars, town meetings, forums, and media presentations are among the activities eligible for support.

The Foundation believes that the humanities - history, philosophy, litera-

ture, ethics, jurisprudence, the social sciences . . . - can provide a perspective that helps us understand public issues, examine priorities, and explore alternatives. Public policy issues include questions related to growth, technology, rural and urban development, health, education, crime, unemployment, the uses of land and water, human and individual rights and community needs, the process and form of government. Opportunities for people of different ages, lifestyles, ethnic, and social groups to participate in the community involve a number of specific issues which a program might address.

Programs should provide an opportunity for the public and scholars in the humanities to exchange views in a discussion of issues important to the community and should be objective and educational in the general sense.

The final application deadline for programs planned for the spring, summer, and early fall is March 5, 1976.

LIBRARY NEWS

A new service will be offered by Smith Library beginning during the current term, that of bibliographic instruction to students. This instruction will be offered in conjunction with the classroom teaching of any faculty member who requests it.

Faculty members interested in having a reference librarian speak to their classes should contact Charles Brownson in the library at extension 7132 to discuss their ideas. The library offers instruction ranging from orientation tours to one or several sessions on research in the CNC library or on the bibliography of a discipline. The first aim of the library's new service will be to develop library skills in new students.

Librarians hope the new instructional program will be of use to faculty as well as students and urge interested members of the faculty to inquire. Several days preparation will be needed for orientation tours; at least a week for regular lectures.
