## CNC adds to list of Earth Day Projects

Here is a list of some of the projects that students nationwide have been working on in anticipation of April 22, Earth Day 1990.

\*The CNC Board of Visitors resolved to establish a permanent moratorium on cutting trees in the small portion of woods between the New Science Building and the North Parking Lot. This portion of woods will be classified as an Outdoor Classroom and be designated as Wise Woods. E. Spencer Wise is a Professor Emeritus who worked in the Biology Department. The Woods will be dedicated formally on April 22, 1990 in conjunction with Earth Day, 1990, the twentieth anniversary of Earth Day.

\*The Spelman College (Atlanta) student government has started a campus recycling project and is coordinating weekly environmental projects.

\*Non-traditional students at Concoria College in St. Paul, Minn., are working to replace disposable diapers with cloth diapers at the campus day care center.

\*Fraternities at Alabama's Birmingham Southern University have taken on a campus-wide recycling project. Students separate the garbage into groups--such as plastics, glass and papers--for disabled groups to pick up materials for recycling.

\*Dartmouth College students and local residents in New Hampshire will take a 1-mile walk on Earth Day that will end with the planting of 500 white pine seedlings.

\*The senior class at Bentley College in Waltham, Mass., raised nearly \$20,000 to refurbish the Center for Business Ethics library with books, periodicals and videotapes about the environment.

\*Students at Washington University in St. Louis are "buying" rain forest land at \$50 per acre. Various student groups are raising the money to sponsor and protect rainforests through Program for Belize.

## Corruption and storm stirring in "Jean Brodie"

How a high-voltage teacher enters and also corrupts a classroom full of young girls and stirs up a storm in two men teaching in the same school, is the subject of *the Prime of Miss Jean Brodie*, the next CNC Theatre production to open Friday, April 13, in the John W. Gaines Theatre on the campus of Christopher Newport College.

Jean Brodie is a determinedly romantic and menacingly misguided teacher who, whether or not in her prime, as she insists, leaves an ineradicable impact on her impressionable pupils in an upper-class private school and on her fellow teachers as well.

This tale of a spinster intent on goading her class into admiring what she admires, even if the parents of her charges and the school authorities would be horrified at the ideas she is imposing on them -- if they knew what she was doing -- was written by an American, Mrs. Jay Allen, on the basis of Scotswoman Muriel Spark's novel of the same name. First produced in

London in 1966, with Vanessa Redgrave in the role of the fatally-fascinating teacher, it proved also a triumph when Zoe Caldwell portrayed Miss Brodie in New York for a run that extended almost from the beginning to the end of 1986 -- 11 months in all.

The drama tells not only of Miss Brodie's irrepressible drive to "stimulate and uplift" her pupils, "but also of how she keeps two men teachers in her school in a steaming uncertainty about their relations with her.

One of these is the art teacher Teddy Lloyd, an ineffectual part-time artist who is married and has five children. Though he is a Catholic and thus undivoriceable, he can't get Miss Brodie out of his mind, even after she throws one of her pupils into his arms as a means of not returning there herself. The other, Gordon Lowther, is the music teacher and unattached, even a little wealthy, but Miss Brodie keeps him dangling so long she loses him.

The four votaries of her classroom (Sandy, Mary, Monica and Jenny) are called by Brodie the "creme de la creme,"

entitled to this seal of approval simply because they are her pupils who have been exposed to her eccentric pedagogical methods.

In the end, after cleverly out-maneuvering the headmistress and other authorities, Miss Brodie is betrayed by

one of her adoring pupils. She is exposed as espousing the wrong kind of politics, a matter on which she can be nailed more readily than for espousing the wrong kind of morality. At the end Miss Brodie passes from her prime to her downfall.

The play has the credentials of having been acclaimed with rhapsodic enthusiasm by critics in New York and London. One critic, Jack Kroll of Newsweek, declared that it possessed "the sharpest, most glitteringly faceted social, psychological and spiritual insight, and is the most delicately balanced of moral comedies."

The cast includes Margie Thomas (Brodie), Kim Mills (Mackay), Russell Hackney (Lloyd), Richard Sarner (Lowther), Kitty Randall (Sandy), Jules Curry (Monica), Heather Burgess (Jenny), Kimberly Gardner (Mary), Becky Broadus (Sister Helena), Mike Diana (Perry) and Mary Pat Telstad (Campbell). Others in the cast are Juliet Bickford, Whitney Hoffman, Lisa Silum, Jessica Dawn Purd'homme and Nicole Ledtje.

The production is directed by Bruno Koch. Hank Sparks is Scene Designer, Laurel Tsimokos Costume Designer and David Balthrop Lighting Designer. Lissa Graham is Assistant Director and Lucy May Stage Manager.

The play opens on Friday, April 13, in the John W. Gaines Theatre on the campus of Christopher Newport College. Additional performances are scheduled for Saturday, April 14, Friday, April 20 and Saturday, April 21. Curtain time for all performances is 8 p.m.

General price of admission is \$5.00. Discounts are available to Christopher Newport College students, faculty and staff, as well as for senior citizens and groups.

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# Reception honors Jim Moore for years of service

A shiny new red bicycle, complete with horn, two wire baskets for books, leg protectors, a chain and lock and a red cap to match, stole the show at the reception at The Terrace on Friday, March 30, to honor Jim Moore.

Formerly a professor of Criminal Justice in the Political Science Department, for which his doctorate in the field had well prepared him, Jim, who retired as a full time faculty member in 1989, is currently teaching two introductory computer courses at the college.

In addition, he voluntarily heads the ElderLearning Society, a CNC program involving retired individuals over age 55.

Jim also received a gift certificate for two at the Nara of Japan restaurant on Warwick Boulevard. Olive, his wife, who picks up Jim by car on rainy days, was presented with a bouquet of roses. When someone suggested that the new vehicle would enable Jim to retire his old bicycle, for a moment he looked fondly at his former mode of transportation, but relaxed when Ruth Olney proposed the establishment of a museum at CNC in which the old bike might be featured.

Paying tribute with warmth and humor were several members of the faculty. Harvey Williams, professor of Political Science and department chairman when Jim was first hired in 1971, commented on Jim's penchant for making telephone calls. When Harvey was once on a business trip, he had accommodations at a hotel so deluxe the bathroom possessed a telephone. While taking a shower, he was surprised to hear the phone ring. Picking up the receiver, he discovered the caller was Jim Moore calling to see how things were going. Professor Williams also recalled how when Jim first joined the faculty, he enabled many of the professors to survive the poverty years by teaching them how to fix up old cars.

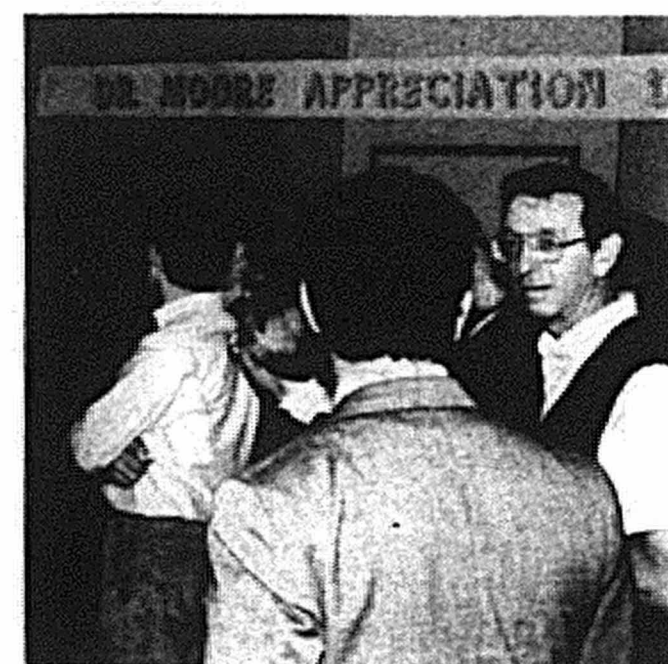
Doctor Jouett (Doc) Powell, Dean of Letters and Natural Science at CNC, and Jim's former mentor at the college,

praised Jim's retirement policy which may be stated as, "retire early, retire often, but keep on working."

Shahram Amiri, Director of Computing Services opened the program and introduced the speakers. In addition, he combined talents with Viki Simerly, secretary of the department, and Brian Foran, photographer, to coordinate the reception.

The men's tennis team took both of their matches this week against Longwood and King's College of Pennsylvania. Those wins raised their record to 9-2.

## A busy weekend at CNC

This past weekend was a busy one for the area behind Ratcliffe Gym. On Saturday, the track team hosted the Captains' Classic meet for 25 schools from as far away as Pennsylvania; beside the track the soccer team hosted Virginia and Old Dominion in a "Mini-Tournament."

On the track, both men's and women's teams won their divisions for the seventh time in nine years. The men scored 118 points to win their title and the women scored 180 to win their crown.

Freshman Tony Rodriguez was a double winner for the men. He won the long jump with a new meet record of 22-7, and won the triple jump with a leap of 47-1 3/4. Other winners included Chris Alcott in the 110-meter hurdles in a time of 15.41 and Jerome Valree took the 800 meters in 1:56.4. The men's 400 meter relay team won in 43.30.

For the women, Shelia Trice won three events to lead the team to their title. She took the long jump at 17-8 3/4, the 100 meters in 12.28, and the 200

meters in a meet record 24.98. Lisa Molineaux and Cynthia Bryant each had two wins for the Lady Captains. Molineaux won the javelin at 113-2 and

the shot put at 37-2 1/2. Bryant captured the 100 meter hurdles in 16.01 and the 400 meter hurdles in 1:09.7.

Over on the soccer field, the soccer team held their own against top-notch competition in Virginia and Old Dominion. Their first match was against the defending Co-National Champions Virginia. The Cavaliers came away with a 3-0 victory in a game played in a few puddles on the field. 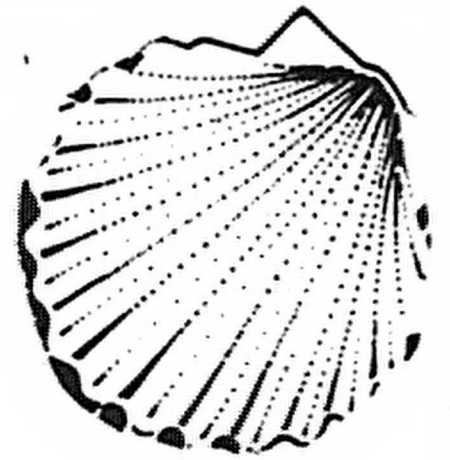

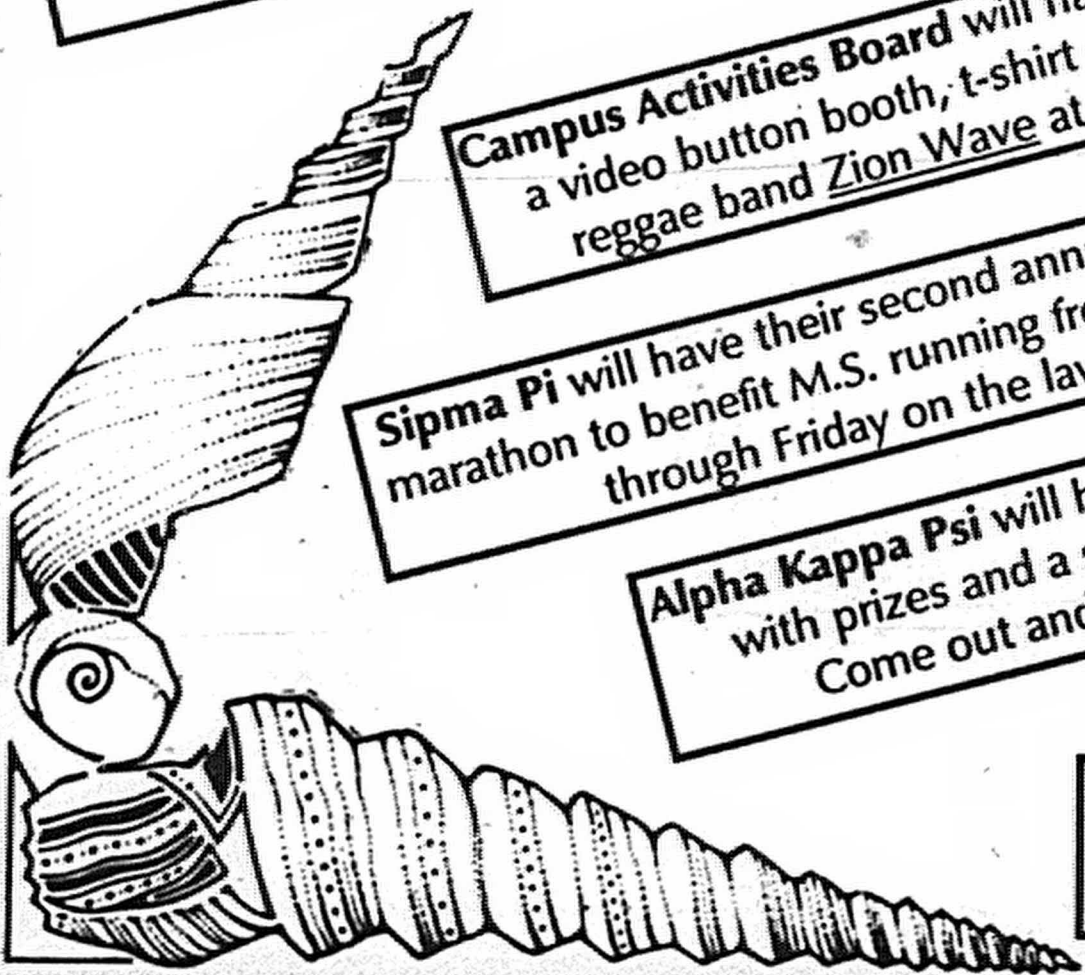
