# Virginia State Board of Education Visitation

On March 10-12, a committee authorized by the Virginia State Board of Education to evaluate the CNC Teacher Education Programs for "approved program status" will visit the campus. Members of the eight-person committee will be meeting with members of the Faculty, Administration, and Student Body and will be visiting facilities to validate our self study and evaluate our programs against the standards adopted by the State Board of Education.

With the approved program approach to teacher preparation, institutions of higher learning have an increased responsibility for controlling the quality of the candidates entering and exiting teacher preparation programs and for defining the total academic program through which teachers are prepared. Attainment of "approved status" would have significance for our graduates in the areas of certification reciprocity with other states and ease of obtaining Virginia Teaching credentials.

#### Dean's Colloquia Series to Present Two Programs

Prior to his present assignment, Ambassador Carter served as U.S. envoy to Liberia, Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary for African Affairs, and Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs. He has also served in Nigeria and Kenya.





#### Appropriations for 1980-81

The Virginia General Assembly adjourned on Saturday, March 8, 1980. The Assembly appropriated the following amounts for Christopher Newport College for 1980-81 operating expense:

Total	Educationa	1 and General	\$6,326,330
To	be paid by	General Fund	4,339,850
		College Revenues	1,986,480

The Assembly appropriated \$71,300 for scholarships and loans, of which \$34,000 is designated for affirmative action tuition and expense grants.

Also appropriated was \$102,000 for the operating costs of federally sponsored grants, with revenues from such grants to equal expenditures.

The operations of auxiliary enterprises, which are entirely funded by college revenues, were appropriated a total of \$884,000 for 1980-81.

The Assembly approved the following capital outlay construction expenditures:

Campus Center expansion	\$2,032,185
Track	395,185
Science Building	3,290,360
Energy conservation rennovations	372,160
Roof repairs and other maintenance	211,940
Site improvements, sidewalks, lighting	17,000

The Campus Center Phase II and track will be funded by the sale of revenue bonds which must be repaid by the College. Other construction will be funded by the state general fund.

During the next two months the operating budgets for departments and divisions will be developed through the Offices of the Vice Presidents and Deans.
