September Meeting of the Instructional Faculty

The Instructional Faculty will meet at 3:30 p.m., Wednesday, September 17, 1986, in A-105. Committee chairmen and individual faculty members who wish to place items of business on the agenda for consideration at this meeting must submit the substance of such items to this office no later than noon, Wednesday, September 10, 1986. It would be helpful to all concerned if all committee reports to be presented at this meeting were submitted for publication by this deadline as well. The agenda will be published in the Chronicle of September 12, 1986.

One item of business that will be considered at this meeting is the election of two faculty representatives to each of five ad hoc advisory task forces to the Board of Visitors. These task forces were created by the Board of Visitors earlier this year for the purposes of studying the goals and objectives adopted by the Board in the spring and advising the appropriate Board committee relative to their implementation. The five task forces and their areas of concern are listed below:

1. Academic Activities (Reports to the Board Committee on Academic Affairs)
 - Mission Statement
 - Faculty Development
 - Honors Program
 - Liaison on Graduate Studies
2. Non Academic Student Activities (Reports to the Board Committee on Student Affairs)
 - Residential Living
 - Intramural Athletics
3. Legislative Relations and Financial Affairs (Reports to the Board Committee on Financial Affairs)
 - State Funding Parity
 - Endowment Expansion
 - Constituency Involvement in Legislative Process
4. Community Needs (Reports to the Board Committee on Development and College Relations)
 - Master Plan Update
 - Land Aquisition Plan
 - Public Awareness of CNC
5. Minority Representation (Reports to the Board Committee on Academic Affairs)
 - Student Body
 - Faculty

Each task force will be chaired by the faculty liaison to its parent Board Committee. In addition, the membership of each will consist of the two faculty members elected on 9/17, one member of the administrative faculty appointed by the President, and, when appropriate, a member of the staff, student body, alumni, and/or other constituency. The Nominations Committee will present nominees for the ten elected faculty positions on 9/17; nominations from the floor will, of course, be welcome. A statement of the goals and objectives adopted by the Board of Visitors last spring follows this announcement.

As is the case with all meetings of the Instructional Faculty, all other members of the College community are welcome to attend this meeting as observers.

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Goals and Objectives for Christopher Newport College (Adopted March, 1986).

The Board of Visitors of Christopher Newport College hereby resolves to continue their efforts toward academic excellence and quality of life in all departments of Christopher Newport College by adoption of the following goals and objectives:

Short Term

1. Revise the current Mission Statement in a comprehensive but concise manner as to what CNC is striving to be.
2. Enhance the quality of student life by:
 - a. Providing residential living
 - b. Improving the Honors Program
 - c. Improving intramural athletics
3. Develop a well designed persuasive statement of our needs (in terms of dollars). Place emphasis on pursuing legislative solutions to increase the financial allocations to CNC by the State, including:
 - a. Correction of historical full time/part time faculty ratio disparity as well as bringing all salaries and wages up to adequate levels.
 - b. Increased funding for faculty development
4. Seek improved minority representation among faculty and students.

Long Term

1. Undertake a study of community needs in undergraduate academic programs and determine the extent to which these needs are being met.
2. Set up liaison committees with other colleges and universities to pursue graduate programs located on our campus under their sponsorship and other programs of mutual interest.
3. Improve public awareness of CNC as a quality institution responsive to the needs of the community and the region.
4. Create a general endowment fund of \$3,000,000.
5. Review and update the master plan and seek to acquire additional real estate where feasible.

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Holiday Leave

The College will observe the following holiday schedule during the Fall Semester:

LABOR DAY - The College will be closed on Labor Day, September 1, 1986. This is an authorized holiday, and annual leave is not charged. Classes will meet but all offices will be closed.

THANKSGIVING - The College will be closed on Thanksgiving Day, November 27, and on Friday, November 28, 1986. Both days are authorized holidays and annual leave is not charged.

CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR'S DAY - The College will close at 12:00 noon December 24, 1986, and remain closed until 8:00 a.m., January 2, 1987. All of these days are authorized holidays with the exception of December 24, 1986. Traditionally, Governors have authorized State government offices to be closed for one-half day for Christmas Eve. Taking this practice into consideration, one-half day will be observed as Christmas Eve on December 24. If the Governor does not authorize the additional four hours of Christmas leave, four hours of an-

nual leave will be charged for the afternoon of December 24.

Employees required for necessary services on the above holidays are eligible for compensatory leave.

Unauthorized Use of SCATS Telephone Service

The following memorandum was received from the Department of Information Technology, J. Westwood Smithers, Director:

This is to remind you of the Commonwealth's long-standing policy which prohibits use of the State Controlled Administrative Telephone Service (SCATS) for long distance telephone calls for purposes other than State business. In our effort to contain and reduce telecommunications costs, it is important to periodically reinforce our employees' awareness of this policy. It has been the experience of governments elsewhere that failure to do so can result in substantial charges for unauthorized long distance calls, a consequence which we must avoid.

Accordingly, please ensure that your employees are aware that they may not, except in an emergency, use the State's telephone system for personal long distance calls. The cost of any personal calls must be reimbursed, and appropriate disciplinary measures should be imposed.

I would appreciate your efforts to enforce this policy. The Department of Information Technology will be happy to assist you by identifying calls placed from your telephones in the event that you believe unauthorized use has occurred.

Awards range in duration from three to nine months and provide a maintenance allowance plus round-trip air fare. Equipment available for in-library use, in addition to the preceding, includes: 1/2" and 3/4" VCR's, video camera, color televisions/monitors, Apple II+ and IBM PC microcomputers, laser disc player and transparency maker.

EQUIPMENT DELIVERIES TO YOUR CLASSROOM:

-Requests should be made 48 hours prior to anticipated use

-All deliveries are made Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
-Requests made less than 48 hours prior to use time must be picked up by the instructor from Media unless otherwise noted by the Media representative. Deliveries by Media to the classroom are not guaranteed with less than 48 hours notice.

EQUIPMENT BORROWED ON A SEMESTER-LOAN BASIS:

-Equipment available for classroom use can be reserved for use at designated site(s) on campus, subject to availability

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National Faculty Exchange

As of July 1, 1986, Christopher Newport College became a member of the National Faculty Exchange. The following description of the program and its goals, and benefits, was taken from the NFE Handbook:

The National Faculty Exchange (NFE) is a centrally directed institution-based membership program which has been designed to facilitate opportunities for exchange of faculty, administrators and staff among colleges, universities, or any other agency or entities in the United States, its territories and Canada. NFE provides an opportunity for faculty and staff to revitalize their professional and personal perspectives through a change of working and living environments.

As one component of an institution's faculty, administrator and staff development programs, the National Faculty Exchange introduces new people with new ideas into academic programs, faculty and student services and the administrative structures of the institution. In addition, it provides ways for faculty and staff to have an experience which will stimulate them to discover and try fresh approaches to professional tasks.

The National Faculty Exchange does not replace careful hiring of new faculty and staff and aggressive sabbatical programs; however, a formal, coordinated program of exchange among a committed group of institutions may provide a new means for faculty and staff development, a creative mechanism for a college or university to fill temporary faculty or staff needs, and new options for interinstitutional communication and cooperation.

The exchange of professional personnel is a significant approach to faculty and staff development. The variety and number of opportunities in higher education across the United States, coupled with the cultural and geographic diversity in this country, provide countless combinations of learning situations. Through the mechanism of the National Faculty Exchange, these opportunities are available at minimal cost to both the exchange participant and the institution. The small investment necessary to provide interested participants with the chance to leave their usual place of employment will result in multiplied benefits for participants, institutions and higher education.

The results of working in a new situation are not easily defined because they vary considerably with the individual involved. There is the nebulous, but real, personal growth and renewal that comes in planning and making a change from the normal routine and setting. It involves facing new challenges and stimuli while being away from the accustomed faces and tasks. From the experience comes added energy, revitalization, changes in perspective, new ideas, and a sense of accomplishment.

Exchange offers an opportunity to teach new courses, be involved in different tasks and establish new professional contacts. Since the exchange participant is not likely to be involved in committee work, academic advising or extensive university service at the host institution, the individual is more free to pursue new teaching and research options than had he/she remained on the home campus.

Increased knowledge comes from the interchange of ideas with new colleagues, new library and other resources, and new research opportunities. In addition, there may be a chance to develop new courses; to examine different approaches to solving problems; to observe new technologies; to interact with new student populations; observe varied administrative settings; and to experience different programs, curricula, educational philosophies, and services.

For the institution, exchange offers the opportunity to schedule new courses or offer existing course options with new faces and varied approaches. The exchange of ideas between the participant and his/her new colleagues may spark new instructional or administrative approaches. Exchange offers the campus an opportunity to fill a need in one area, while giving faculty members in lower enrolled areas an opportunity for new and creative challenges at other institutions. Introduction of new faculty and staff may provide an institution with the opportunity to create new programs or services, solve administrative problems, improve existing programs, or identify approaches to areas of reorganization, retrenchment or retraining.

Other advantages for the institution may include developing projects and working relationships with other colleges and universities, accessing a pool of pre-screened faculty and staff as alternates to short term hiring situations, increasing opportunities, providing faculty and staff mobility while retaining them as continuing employees, expanding opportunities for sabbaticals and other leaves by replacing the outgoing individual with an exchange counterpart in the same or another discipline, and demonstrating care for the development and well-being of the institution's faculty and staff.

The deadline to apply for participation in the National Faculty EXchange Program for 1987-1988 is November 15, 1986. A Review of Exchange Opportunities for the current year will inform the prospective participant of the kinds of opportunities available in 1987-88. COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Ad Hoc Committee on Assessment of Student Achievement

The Committee received its charge from Vice President Summerville on March 17, 1986, to make recommendations regarding "the process by which Christopher Newport College will come into timely compliance with the requirements of SJR83." This resolution of the 1986 Session essentially requires the establishment of assessment programs to measure student achievement at each of Virginia's state-supported colleges and universities.

In its deliberations thus far, the Committee has worked on several important issues:

1. One is the need to inventory the types of data which already exist and are routinely collected from our students which could have bearing on our assessment program. Relatedly, we are concerned with our capability to query student data bases in regard to student achievement as well as obtaining profiles of student characteristics that accompany various levels of achievement.
2. We are reviewing several assessment devices in the area of general education and are comparing them with the general education objectives at Christopher Newport College.
3. We are concerned with monitoring departmental initiatives in developing assessment plans specific to their majors.
4. We have begun to consider ways to tap into faculty and alumni perceptions of student achievement here.
5. We have been considering at a very fundamental level what is involved in effective student learning and how one can most validly assess students' gains in that area.
