Minutes of Faculty Meeting of December 12, 1986

- I. The minutes of the meeting of November 14, 1986 were approved.
- II. Committee Reports:

 - E. Faculty Advisory Committee—Handouts regarding nominations for Outstanding Common-wealth Faculty Awards were disseminated. Nominations and applications should be submitted by January 20, since the FAC will review them February 5, 1987.
 - F. Nominations Committee -- No Reports.
- III. The list of candidates for graduation in January 1987, as indicated in <u>The Chronicle</u> of December 5, was approved subject to their successful completion of all degree requirements.
- IV. The recommendation of the Curriculum Committee that the courses outlined in The Chronicle of December 5, 1986 be added to the College curriculum was approved.
 - V. The recommendation of the Curriculum Committee that English 207-208 be designated "global" and renumbered 207G-208G was approved.
- VI. The recommendation of the Curriculum Committee that the distribution requirements of the College be changed as outlined in The Chronicle of December 5 was approved.
- VII. Dr. Summerville updated the faculty on the status of the SCHEV faculty salary benchmark system. Faculty were advised that if the Council of Higher Education and the legislature approve the current proposal, CNC faculty will witness an increase in the average salary from \$31,003 (current average salary) to \$35,883 (benchmark salary for 1987-88). Dr. Summerville explained that the increases would most likely be implemented over a three-year period, with yearly salary hikes of 9.22 percent.

Dr. Summerville also advised the faculty that when he is apprised of the dollars CNC will receive for incremental increases, he will divide the money among the three schools. He has asked the deans to recommend how the money will be dispersed within each school. Whatever method of selection is used should be consistent with school policy and relevant to the College's standards—teaching, service, and professional development

VIII. Announcements:

- A. Dr. Hubbard announced that 25th Anniversary commemorative plates are still on sale.
- B. Mr. McLoughland announced that the fifth presidential candidate will be visiting the campus December 15. After the open session on Monday and after the faculty meeting today, members of the Presidential Search Committee will be available to hear responses to the candidates.
- IX. The meeting was adjourned at 3:35 p.m.
