The Captains are ranked No. 14 in the nation in the NCAA Division III poll. CNC has an 11-4 record, and has lost only to teams that give athletic scholarships. In addition, CNC has won three games against scholarship competition.

The Captains are currently in first place in the Dixie Conference, and are trying to win their fourth conference championship in the last five years.

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### STUDENT ACTIVITIES REPORT

FALL 1989

During the Fall 1989 semester, 30 student organizations sponsored 182 activities with an average attendance of 128 people per event.

Gamma Phi Beta sponsored the most activities (22). The type of event they sponsored the most was Fund Raising.

26 Student Organizations held a total of 306 meetings. The Student Government Association sponsored the most meetings (38) while the mean number of meetings per organization was 12 and the median 8.

#### Activity Breakdown

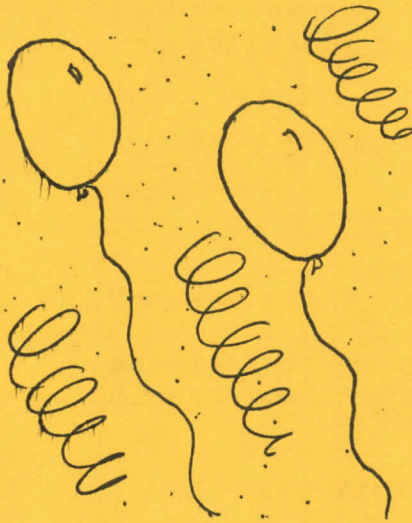

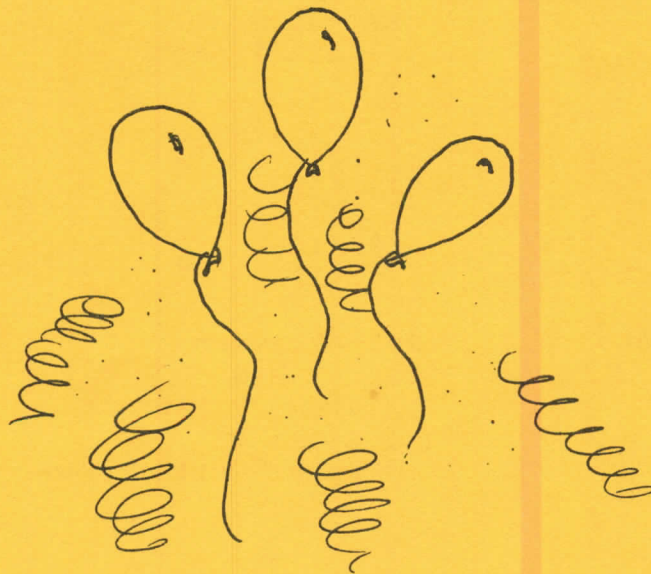
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HOMEcoming '90 - MARDI GRAS MADNESS

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The PRC has developed the following proposed revision of criteria that will be used in future departmental reviews. We welcome your opinion regarding the new criteria and will hold an open meeting to hear your comments on Friday, February 2 at 2:00 p.m. in Wingfield 103.

### Revised Criteria: PRC

## FOCUS AND GOALS OF THE PRC EVALUATION

The primary goal of the PRC evaluation process is to encourage each department to periodically examine its own objectives and its use of curriculum, staff, and resources to meet those objectives. There should be as much involvement at the departmental level as possible in the preparation of the report to the PRC so that every faculty member might have the opportunity to provide input into the review of the departmental program. This process should be viewed as the department's opportunity to interpret its own situation for its peers and for the Administration, as much with the goal of stating its case for special needs and considerations as for the goal of identifying any problems or weaknesses. The PRC recommendations are to be made in this same spirit of positiveness and cooperativeness.

## SPECIFIC CRITERIA FOR EVALUATION OF DEPARTMENTAL PROGRAMS

- I. Departmental goals and objectives
- II. Centrality of the program to the College Curriculum and Mission
  - College-service courses
  - College-distribution courses
  - College-major courses
  - Community service: majors, faculty, (consulting, seminars, non-credit and off campus courses)
  - Other evidence of centrality
- III. Demand for the Program
  - Current job market
  - Predicted job market
  - Present and potential student demand
  - Minor program(s) or concentrations
  - Other evidence of demand
- IV. Use of resources
  - Utilization of faculty and staff
  - Use of part-time, adjunct and overload faculty
  - Use of manageable resources (i.e. release time, travel funds, faculty development funds, sabbatical leaves, leaves of absence, etc.)
