




DRAMATIC WORKSHOP OFFICIALLY ORGANIZED; ELECTS GWEN SEIDLER TO THE PRESIDENCY

See them in class. The boy is slumped in his chair. He is asleep The girl is slumped in her chair. She is asleep too. The professor is very dull.


See them studying. It is 4:30 in the morning. They have a test today. See the little pills. They keep him awake. See the bottles under the boy's bed. They put him to sleep.


After the banquet ceremonies, the members retired to the Strawberry Banks Motor Inn for a party.

During the senior year in high school, students are warned of the differences between high school and college. The problem is that they are not taught how to pick up the spoon, much less how to feed themselves before they enter college.

One of the high schools on the peninsula made an attempt to prepare its students for the rough college road of their seniors.
