FACULTY/STAFF/STUDENT NEWS

Paula Delo, Director of Public Relations, sponsored the area-wide Assertainment Meeting of all radio and television general managers and news directors at the College on November 26.

The FCC mandates that all stations using the airways must hold regular assertainment meetings throughout their broadcast area to hear comments from public, civic, private groups and citizens. The meetings are held for eight hour periods with appearances from major interest groups every twenty minutes.

The College furnished Room 233 with coffee and danish in the morning and sodas and hot coffee and tea through the day. The group ate lunch in the Terrace. It was the first visit to the College for most of them. Many citizens who came to appear before the group also visited the College for the first time.

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An analysis of several papers concerning word-music interrelationships in works by Machaut and Dufay, has been published by Clyde W. Brockett in Ars Lyrica.

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Professor Guthrie's paper, "Albert Camus and Hans Erich Nossack: In the Beginning is the Word," delivered last year at the Mountain Interstate Foreign Language Conference at Furman University in South Carolina, has been accepted for publication in Selected Proceedings of the Conference.

Minutes of the Faculty Meeting of November 14, 1986

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Summerville, the presiding officer.

The minutes of the meeting of 9/17/86 were approved

- III. The faculty approved the recommendation of the Curriculum Committee that English 450 be added to the curriculum.
- IV. The faculty, acting upon the recommendation of the Degrees Committee, approved 14 student petitions, outlined in the 11/7/86 issue of the Chronicle.
- V. The faculty, acting upon the recommendation of the Degrees Committee, approved three policies, outlined in the 11/7/86 issue of the Chronicle, pertaining to transfer students and the global requirement.
- VI. The faculty approved the recommendation of the Academic Status Committee that the minimum GPA required for inclusion on the Dean's Academic Honor List be increased from 3.25 to 3.50.
- VII. Faculty approved the recommendation of the Admissions Committee that the third "special admission requirement" for the high school enrichment program be changed from:
 - (3) Written recommendation of the high school principal, headmaster, or guidance counselor.
 - to
 - (3) Written recommendation of the high school principal, headmaster, or guidance counselor is required only if the student is taking CNC courses during normal high school hours or wishes the credit to count towards a high school diploma.
- VIII. Mr. Eagle, Vice President for Financial Affairs, reviewed the history of and apprised the faculty of the current status of the Higher Education Equipment Fund. Vice President Eagle said that in 1983 the Council of Higher Education concluded that institutional equipment on state campuses was in poor condition and estimated that \$400 million would be needed statewide to replace the equipment.

In 1984-86, the General Assembly allocated \$30 million for equipment enhancement. CNC's share of these monies was \$200,000 for the first year and \$337,000 for the second. These allocations, restricted to instructional equipment, were insufficient, so in January 1986, the General Assembly passed the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund, a self-replenishing fund of \$90 million, gained through the sale of tax-exempt bonds. The fund provides CNC with \$100,000, our share based on our enrollment of 2,500 FTES.
- IX. Dr. Summerville, Vice President for Academic Affairs, updated the faculty on the status of the SCHEV peer groups. Dr. Summerville said that the Council of Higher Education, at the behest of the General Assembly, had selected a group of 25 colleges nationwide, which are most like CNC, both quantitatively and qualitatively. This list is to be used in determining faculty salaries.

Though CNC's peer group list has changed several times, the current list targets a benchmark salary of \$35,900.

The General Assembly has set for itself the goal of meeting the SCHEV estimates for 1989-90. Should the General Assembly meet its goal and should the current peer list be kept, CNC faculty could witness successive raises within the next three years of 9.5 percent.

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Approved Minutes of Curriculum Committee Meeting - 11/10/86

Present: Weber (Chairman), Barbour, Bostick, Cheney, Durel, Hornik, King, Maris, Powell, Turner

The minutes from the October 22, 1986 meeting were approved.

Dr. Smith presented ENGL 208G, Literature and Ideas, for discussion and requested that the course be accepted as global. The course was approved by the Committee.

Based on increased enrollment and the need by both the Department of English and Department of Education, Dr. Stark requested a status change in the topics course, ENGL 395, Adolescent Literature, be made. The course would be known as ENGL 315. The Committee approved the change.

Dr. Friedman presented for discussion EDUC 452, Teaching Computer Programming with Logo, currently being taught as a topics course. The course was approved by the Committee.

Three new course proposals were presented by Mr. Hubbard: LSPE 312, Adaptive and Corrective Physical Education (to replace a current topics course), LSPE 325, First Aid, and LSPE 435, Leisure Services Management. Both LSPE 312 and LSPE 325 would be required of LSPE majors specializing in the Recreation Option and are required for State certification. LSPE 435, also required of LSPE majors, would replace LSPE 417, Organization and Administration of Physical Education and Athletics. After lengthy discussion the Committee voted to accept LSPE 312 and LSPE 325 and to temporarily postpone acceptance of LSPE 435; the teaching staff will be invited to speak to the Committee concerning course content.

The next meeting will be on Monday, November 24, 1986 at 3:15 p.m. in M-202.

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Report of the Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee recommends faculty approval of the following:

New Courses:

- 1) MUSC 207G-208G The World's Music (3-3-0) (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: None; corequisite: None. Fall, 207G; Spring, 208G.

A course that traces the development of music as a universal language through the recognition of various traditions of music worldwide. Students become familiar with major music literature, and interacting folk and popular elements. Societal issues, such as worship, dance, and fads, and ethnic distinctions are introduced. This course fulfills CNC's humanities distribution requirement and is recommended for all non-music majors.

- 2) ENGL 315 Young Adult Literature (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: None

Discover what novels young adults are reading. Read the best fiction for secondary school students. Learn instructional techniques in critical reading and literary analysis.

- 3) EDUC 452 Teaching Computer Programming With LOGO (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Senior standing or permission of the instructor.

This course focuses on the techniques of teaching computer programming to students from Kindergarten through Middle School. The computer language used is the MIT version of LOGO. Programming using the microcomputer is an integral part of this course. No previous computer experience is required. The course may be used to satisfy the Virginia State computer literacy requirement, for middle school concentration, and for teacher certification or recertification.

- 4) LSPE 312 Adaptive and Corrective Physical Education (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Junior standing and PSYC 207 or 309 or 312.

A study of the adapted physical education programs in the public schools with emphasis

on the observation and analysis of motor performance of atypical individuals. Included is a study of Public Law 94-142 and implementation of individual education programs for the handicapped. Particular attention will focus on the instruction program and teaching techniques appropriate for educating learners who are emotionally disturbed, orthopedically impaired, mentally retarded, deaf or visually impaired.

5) LSPE 325 First Aid (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Junior Status or Consent of the Instructor.

Emphasizes standard first aid care and cardiopulmonary resuscitation procedures for various emergency conditions including wounds, shock, respiratory emergencies, choking, poisoning, drugs and drug abuse, burns, frostbite and exposure, heat illness, sudden illness, and bone and joint injuries. Opportunity to earn American Red Cross certifications in Standard First Aid and Basic Life Support (CPR).

6) LSPE 435 Leisure Services Management (3-3-0)

Prerequisites: LSPE 301, LSPE 430, or consent of the Instructor.

An introduction to the fundamental concepts, theories, principles, and practices in the administration and supervision of leisure services, including organizational management, administrative roles and responsibilities, legal foundations, personnel practices, training and development, labor relations, personnel evaluation, and financial and business procedures.

7) MATH 145 Discrete Mathematics (4-4-0)

Prerequisite: 3-1/2 years of high-school mathematics, acceptable score on mathematics placement test, or Math 130. Catalog Description:

The developing of theoretical tools suitable for describing algorithmic applications. Topics such as sets, number systems, nature of proofs, formal logic, recursion, combinatorics, graph theory and network algorithms will be covered.

8) MATH 205 College Geometry (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Math 130, 3-1/2 years of high-school mathematics, or acceptable score on mathematics placement test. Catalog Description:

An axiomatic development of Euclidean geometry with emphasis on formal proofs. Introduction to non-Euclidean geometries including projective geometry.

9) ACCT 311-312 Intermediate Accounting I,II (3-3-0)(3-3-0)

10) ACCT 411-412 Advanced Accounting I,II (3-3-0)(3-3-0)

Accounting 311 (replaces Accounting 301). Development of accounting standards and study of objectives of accounting, characteristics of accounting data and systems, assumptions, principles and constraints. Application of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) for accumulating and reporting financial information for cash and receivables, inventories, plant and intangibles. Accounting 201-202 are prerequisites.

Accounting 312 (replaces Accounting 302). A continuation of the application of GAAP to liabilities, equity, revenue recognition, earnings per share, income taxes, pensions, leases, and statements of changes in financial position.

Accounting 411. (This course integrates subjects currently taught in Accounting 302 and Accounting 400, or which are not currently taught in these courses because of time constraints). A continuation of the study and application of GAAP to accounting changes, changing prices, statement analysis, disclosure requirements, partnerships, investments, and business combinations.

Accounting 412 (replaces Accounting 400). The study and application of GAAP to consolidation of financial statements, foreign operations, segmental reporting and interim reporting.
