

Timesheets: Please adhere to the submission schedule on the reverse side of the yellow timesheets. Timesheets are due in the Payroll Office no Later than Noon on the due date. If a timesheet is not received by the deadline it will not be included on the payroll and therefore, the employee will not receive a paycheck on payday! The timesheet will be held in Payroll and included on the next available payroll that is processed. There will normally be no pay advances granted for failure to meet this established deadline.

If you have a timesheet that does not have a schedule on the back there are some available in the Payroll Office.

If the timesheet has more than 39 hours in one calendar week the appropriate Vice President or President must sign before the time can be paid (see Note 1&2 on the timesheet). These signatures are the responsibility of the employee and/or supervisor to obtain before they are received in the Payroll Office. If they have to be taken from the Payroll Office to the VP's Office for signatures and are not received back in Payroll before the deadline, they will not be processed and will be included on the next available payroll.

medieval liturgical drama, "The Slaying of the Holy Innocents," on Sunday, May 24, at 4:00 p.m. in St. Luke's Shrine in Isle of Wight County and at 7:30 p.m. in Trinity Lutheran Church in Newport News.

All programs except the evening of chamber operas are free. The chamber operas are being presented as a part of our fund raising to help defray the expenses of the trip to England. The admission charge is \$5.00. Faculty, Staff, and Student News

Jay Paul gave a reading of poems on May 12 at Tidewater Community College (Frederick Campus).

Dennis Ridley attended the 27th Annual Forum of the Association for Institutional Research in Kansas City, MO, May 2-6, 1987. He presented a paper on "Student Assessment in the Light of How Students Learn Meaningfully."

Dean Terry Maris, of the School of Business & Economics, received the First Runnerup award from the U. S. Small Business Administration for his work as Director of the Small Business Institute at Eastern Illinois University. The consulting report submitted by his team competed against 8,000 entries from all 50 states. It also received the first place award in Illinois and the Midwest region.

Members of the School of Business and Economics Small Business Institute Council participated in a panel discussion Tuesday morning, on the topic of "How to Start a Small Business," which was sponsored by the Virginia Peninsula Chamber of Commerce. Participating were Dr. Marshall Booker, Dr. Robert Coker, Dr. Algin King, Professor Larry Mills, Dr. Wes Pendergrass, Dr. Dexter Rowell, and Dr. Wayne Schell. Dean Terry Maris served as the moderator.

Wes Pendergrass, Management and Marketing, attended two seminars at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law on May 162, 1987. The topics of the seminars were (1) Virginia Land Use Law: Current Issues, Trends and Techniques and (2) Tax Considerations in Choosing and Changing the Form of Business Entity. The seminars were offered through the Continuing Legal Education Program of the Virginia State Bar.

Wendell Barbour is serving on a State Council of Higher Education in Virginia Task Force that is investigating the effect of the Virginia Public Procurement Act upon the procedures used by Virginia's public academic libraries in purchasing books and periodicals.

Wendell Barbour has been appointed as an evaluator for library grant proposals which are submitted to the library coordinator for the State Council of Higher Education in Virginia. Approximately \$35,000 will be awarded for proposals that create projects that will use the new electronic technology for library services and resources.
