



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Monday, October 15th, 8.00 p.m., N.110 Dr. Klaus Biemann, Professor of Chemistry, M.I.T., and a Viking Project Scientist, will speak at CNC on the use of gas chromatography and mass spectrometry in the analysis of chemical and biological systems. By coupling the GC-MS system to a medium-sized computer, fast and efficient identification of complex mixtures, ranging from amino acids in proteins to drugs and their metabolites in body fluids has been accomplished. 
ACADEMIC INTEREST
