

Beginning with the payroll check to be issued on November 16, 1975, it will be possible to regularly deduct for the Newport News Educator's Credit Union. Payroll deductions may be made for savings accounts as well as repayment of loans.

The Credit Union is currently paying 5 3/4% on passbook savings, insured to \$40,000 and with free term life insurance matching savings up to \$2,000.

GRANTS & FELLOWSHIPS

The National Research Council (NRC) announces the Research Associateship Programs for 1976. These programs provide scientists and engineers with opportunities for postdoctoral research on problems in many fields of ATMOSPHERIC & EARTH SCIENCES - CHEMISTRY - ENGINEERING - ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES - LIFE SCIENCES - MATHEMATICS - PHYSICS - and SPACE SCIENCES.

The NRC administers the Research Associateship Programs on behalf of and in cooperation with selected federal research organizations, which have laboratories at about 80 geographic locations in the United States.

Appointments are awarded on a competitive basis. The competition is open to recent recipients of the doctorate and in some cases to senior investigators. Some are open to non-U. S. citizens also.

Approximately 250 to 300 new awards will be made in 1976. Stipends (subject to income tax) will range from \$15,000 upwards. Grants will be provided for family relocation and for professional travel during tenure.

Postmark deadline for applications is January 15, 1976. Awards will be announced in April.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

The FAC has been informed that some funds for Faculty Development Grants fiscal 1975-76, remain available.

The deadline for applications is November 17, 1975. Application forms may be obtained from Webber Casey; completed applications should be sent to Teddy Bostick.

The FAC is currently working to clarify and modify the guidelines for Faculty Development Grants in light of the experience of the past two years. For this fall, however, the current criteria -- reproduced here -- will remain in effect.

College Policy on Faculty Professional Development

- (1) First priority should be given to faculty members who have demonstrated their competence and commitment to CNC, who have completed all requirements for the terminal degree except the dissertation, and to whom the department wishes to make a firm commitment for continued teaching at CNC leading to eventual tenure. The Committee has decided to call this support a Dissertation Grant. The award would be on a one-year, non-renewable basis. The current suggested annual amount of this grant is \$2500. It is understood that the faculty member will return to the College at the end of the grant or repay the grant within the calendar year following the grant's expiration. Faculty members interested in applying for this grant should submit their application to their own Department. The Department's approval of the application will be understood as positive endorsement of that faculty member as a long-range asset to the Department. Departmentally approved applications will then be reviewed by the Faculty Advisory Committee and recommended to the Dean for approval or non-approval.
- (2) Second in priority is the support of professional development for faculty members who have the Ph.D., and who wish to pursue academic research, writing, or development of teaching effectiveness. An ordinary form of this support would be a full-time summer session salary, or quarter or half-time release form teaching responsibilities during an academic semester. This form of support will be called a Professional Development Grant: Once again, faculty applications for this support should be made first to the faculty member's own Department. Departmentally approved proposals will also be reviewed by the Faculty Advisory Committee and recommended to the Dean for approval or non-approval.
- (3) Third in order of priority involves College support for formal graduate study of full-time faculty members who wish to take a graduate-level course at a nearby institution over and above his or her full-time college teaching responsibilities. It is understood such course-work will help develop a faculty member's capability in a way that directly relates to his or her teaching responsibilities at CNC. Applications to take courses which do not directly relate to a faculty member's college responsibilities will be considered, but they will receive a lower priority. Once again, faculty members will submit an application first to their own Department, and upon the Department's approval, be reviewed by the Faculty Advisory Committee before going to the Dean for approval or non-approval.

Procedures

1. Submit completed application form to department for approval.

2. A letter of support from the department chairman--or other designated department member if the applicant is the chairman--should be sent to the FAC.

Applicant should submit form to FAC by November 17, 1975.
 FAC makes recommendations to the Dean of Academic Affairs.

Dean of Academic Affairs awards the grant or refuses the application.

6. Each grant recipient is required to submit a written progress report at the end of the grant period to the Dean A/A, with copies to the FAC and the academic department.
