BRITAIN AND THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY 1992

MAY 6-21, 1992

THE PROGRAM:

This program for students with an interest in economics, business, political science, and international relations is sponsored by Christopher Newport College and Middlesex Polytechnic Institute in London, England. It combines a study program of one week at CNC (Newport News, VA) with a unique experience of a two week long study/tour of England and the development of the European Community. These components provide an immersion into the role of Great Britain in the European Community. The program includes lectures by prominent leaders in the EC Parliament and Council, the United States and Great Britain Missions to the EC, specialists on British international relations, study tours of industrial facilities, import/export businesses and ports development in Britain.

Application deadline is April 3, 1992. All applications must be accompanied by a \$100 fee payable to CNC, to be held and credited toward the final cost of the program.

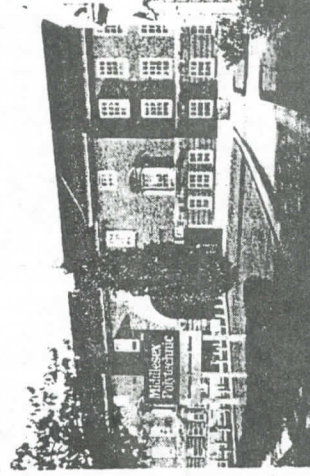
Estimated cost is \$1,800 including in-state tuition, roundtrip airfare (Norfolk-London), room and board, and ground transportation.
