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Spanish Language and Culture for Travel

Christopher Newport College is organizing a special non-credit course which will culminate in a two week field trip* to Spain. During the first eight weeks Professors Reppen and Scheiderer will present classes on Campus. Practical Spanish**, cultural information, and other material designed to prepare the students for their trip to Spain will be presented. On or about December 27, the class and the instructors will fly to Madrid. The Prado, the Palacio Real, the Plaza Colón, Viejo Madrid, the Escorial and the Valle de los Caídos are some of the points of interest the group will visit in the Spanish capital. After five days, including New Year's Eve in the Puerta del Sol, we will travel to Granada, Córdoba, Sevilla, Cadiz and Málaga. During this segment of the field trip we will be seeing the famous Alhambra, the Giralda and other monuments of southern Spain. We will also be able to see a presentation of Flamenco music and dance for which this region of Spain is noted. The last three days of the tour will be spent in Málaga where everybody can enjoy the beach.

*The field trip will cost each student approximately \$900 to \$950 which will include round trip air fare, first class hotel accommodations, continental breakfast daily, etc. Further information will be available at the first class meeting.

**Most will be beginners but provisions will be made for intermediate and advanced students.
