COMMITTEE REPORTS AND FACULTY BUSINESS

Curriculum Committee Minutes

An open meeting of the Curriculum Committee was held March 3, 1989, at 2 p.m., for the purpose of discussing the Modern Language Department's proposed changes in distribution requirements, as outlined in the February 24, 1989, issue of the Chronicle. Chairman Glenn Weber presided over the meeting, which drew approximately 20 people.

Chairman of the Modern and Classical Languages and Literatures Department, Dr. Richard Guthrie, presented his department's recommendation that six hours (one sequence) be required of all candidates for the B.S. Degree and professional studies. Placement examinations, said Dr. Guthrie, would determine the student's proficiency, and B.S. and professional degree candidates who could demonstrate competency beyond the 102 level would satisfy the language requirement for the degree and receive six credits toward graduation. Professor Guthrie said the proposed requirements were in keeping with the direction CNC is taking and the requirements of other Virginia institutions. Professor Guthrie also pointed out that, under the proposed system, students would be motivated to place high on the examination, since they could possibly score well enough to test out of the foreign language requirement and receive academic credit at the same time.

Others at the meeting expressed concern that additional distribution requirements would further reduce the dwindling number of electives available to students in some areas of study and prevent them from taking courses within their fields.

After the open meeting was concluded, the Curriculum Committee conducted the following business:

- The Curriculum Committee set the date of its next meeting for March 22, 1989, at 2 p.m.
- II. The Curriculum Committee agreed to reactivate Political Science courses 342 (Introduction to Criminal Justice), 346 (Issues in Criminal Justice), and 468 (Political Organization and Management).
- III. The Curriculum Committee agreed to place the proposals for the following courses on the agenda for March 22: Political Science 250 and 251 (Introduction to Latin America I and II), Psychology 310 (Applied Behavior Analysis) and Psychology 427 (Methods of Child Study).
 - IV. The Curriculum Committee agreed to place the Modern Language Department's proposal on the agenda for March 22.

1990-91 National Faculty Exchange Opportunities: Preliminary Interest Form

The National Faculty Exchange (NFE) provides faculty, administrators and staff with the opportunity of working at one of over 150 colleges or universities in the United States and Canada while remaining on the payroll of their home institution. Placement opportunities at federal agencies and education associations are also available. NFE, this year for the first time, is cooperating with the Community College Exchange Program (CCEP) to encourage placements for NFE members at CCEP community and junior colleges.

NFE has been the opportunity for new learning and revitalization for many personnel in higher education. Taking advantage of the program can produce new learning and stimulate ideas that just don't seem to come when we face the same people and tasks day after day. By accepting the challenge of new settings and colleagues NFE participants commonly return to the campus with a renewed enthusiasm for their work which results in increasing their efficiency and productivity.

The testimonial of NFE participants and their institutions has been overwhelmingly supportive and enthusiastic of the program. One exchangee commented that she "looked like the same person who had left, but didn't feel like the same person." Another participant stated that "...every now and then people need renewal. NFE offered the best opportunity to experience something new yet maintain an anchor at my home university. It's the best of both worlds." Another exchangee reported that NFE gave him "a chance to shake out the cobwebs from years of routine and repetition," while another "returned feeling refreshed, eager to share new perspectives, and thankful for the opportunity."

If you are interested in the possibility of participating in the National Faculty Exchange for all or part of 1990-1991, please contact Dennis Ridley at 4-7392. You will need to complete a Preliminary Interest Form and return it to the Office of the VPAA by April 17. Note that you are only declaring an interest in exchange, not making a final commitment to apply or participate.

In early August, everyone completing a Preliminary Interest Form will receive a list of others in their field. Your NFE coordinators will receive a list of all applicants who have selected your campus/organization as one of five potential exchange locations. These lists can be used by both you and your NFE coordinator to identify potential counterparts who could serve as your replacement should you decide to submit a final application which will be due November 8, 1989.

Your NFE coordinator has additional information and a brochure describing National Faculty Exchange members and exchange procedures. If you feel bogged down by routine, need an opportunity to interact with different colleagues, or just want to experience a different educational setting, this may be the time to give NFE a try.


