Alcohol on campus has evaporated

There's been a change behind the counter at the Terrace.

Bottles of colorful, high-fructose corn-syrup-filled Nantucket Nectars have replaced the sober bottles of Samuel Adams, Budweiser, and Michelob that used to rest there.

If the change seemed sudden, it was.

Over the summer, a school committee, prompted by a package of recommendations released from the Attorney General's Task Force on Drinking by College Students July 1, 1998, made the decision to ban alcohol sales on the CNU campus.

Although the decision was prob-

ably forthcoming anyway, committee member and Dean of Students Maury O'Connell thought it would be prudent to make the call before the fall semester began.

"This is something that would have happened in the next couple of months anyway," he said, "so it made sense to go ahead and make the decision before school started."

Even though criminal incidents involving drinking amongst students at CNU have never been directly tied to alcohol sales at the Terrace, O'Connell is happy to have the ban in effect.

"We've been fortunate that we've not had any incidents that directly involved students drinking at the Terrace," he said, "but it's not a question of why we stopped serv-

ing alcohol [at the Terrace], it's a question of why we served it at all."

The committee, which also included CNU President Paul Tribble and BACCUS member, student Megan Zahn, attended several Task Force hearings around the state in 1998.

Student reaction to the ban has been mixed.

Juniors Amy Ragan and Neil Hurdelbrink were disappointed.

"We used to go and grab a beer before a test just to relax," Ragan said. "It wasn't to get wasted, people didn't go to the Terrace to do that."

Ragan and Hurdelbrink emphasized that the ban was only likely to encourage students to go else-

where for drinks and that alcohol was readily available to those who wanted it.

"People will want to do it because they can't," said Ragan. "They'll probably just drink in their dorm rooms and say 'forget it.'"

Hurdelbrink was a little more resigned.

"This is my year to turn 21, I was looking forward to it," he said.

Senior Mark Griffin was, for the most part, satisfied with the decision.

"It'll be like prohibition days and the whole first floor of the dorm will be turned into a moonshine factory," he joked, "but seriously, I really don't feel like alcohol and school studies belong together. There should be a bar across from

the school so that people could go to the Terrace to get their food and drinks and then to the bar to get their drinks, y'know what I mean?"

CNU was one of the last college campuses in Virginia to ban alcohol sales.

Other Virginia schools have dealt with the Task Force's recommendations differently. At George Mason, underage drinkers receive mandatory counseling. At Old Dominion University, any student who violates the alcohol policy must take a five-hour class on the dangers of drinking. At William and Mary, alcohol sales are allowed four nights a week in a room of the University Center and by permit at student sponsored events.




Lauryn Hill sings solo on new CD

In 1998, R&B/hip-hop enthusiasts have seen plenty of acts come and go with one hot single that sets a party off, followed by a monotonous album chock full of filler and then, the inevitable disappearance. Poof. Just like that. Now, like the sun rising through dark clouds, comes *The Miseducation of Lauryn Hill* (Ruffhouse/Columbia), the first solo offering from Fugees chanteuse Lauryn Hill.

First seen as a teen with a repressed singing talent in the second Sister Act flick and then micro-braided one-third of rising rap/reggae trio the Fugees, it was evident that this young woman had a unique, earthy quality that her more superficial cohorts lacked. Though the Fugees' debut, *Blunted on Reality* (Ruffhouse/Columbia), served as ground for Hill and her associates alike to polish their act rather than a vehicle for blockbuster success, without question the album hinted at greater things to come.

In turn came *The Score*, (Ruffhouse/Columbia), a multi-platinum success that pushed the group, especially Hill, from virtual unknowns to superstars. When the single "Killing Me Softly" was released in early 1996, it remained an airwave staple for nearly 2 years, thrusting Hill to the group's forefront. As most expected, solo outings would follow *The Score's* breakthrough success. "The Sweetest Thing" (from the "Love Jones" soundtrack) and her cameo on "A Rose is Still A Rose," which she wrote and produced for R&B legend Aretha Franklin, were Hill's first steps in her solo career. After many months of anticipation from fans, the time has come for a solo album and *The Miseducation of Lauryn Hill* is the stunning result.

A consistently engaging, sophisticated fusion of hip-hop and R&B, *Miseducation* is what lovers of Lauryn Hill and the Fugees have been waiting for quite sometime. Almost sample-free and containing 3 hidden tracks, the album's originality is worth the price ticket alone. Though rap fans could complain that the album is short on Hill's trademark rhymes, her flow on "Lost Ones," "Final Hour," and "Doo Wop (That Thing)" is classic and should leave hip-hop die-hards pleased.

The album gems are the ones that Hill sings. One listen to "To Zion" (an ode to her son), "Everything is Everything," "Can't Take My Eyes Off of You," and "The Miseducation of Lauryn Hill," and you can feel the influence of Aretha, Gladys and Roberta bubbling under the surface. The duets are equally appealing, with "Nothing

"Pi": formula for an inspired film

The last time my mind came face to face with God I was definitely high. Which is why it was so delightful to see that mathematics can bring about the same effect. Such is the fate of one Maximilian Cohen, the brilliant, obsessive, and finally altered protagonist of "Pi".

Played by Sean Gullete, Cohen is the

ideal mathematician. But ideal in a Platonic sense, or a Nietzschean one? Proceeding from the premise that mathematics is capable of describing everything in the universe, and in fact the universe itself, Cohen attempts to analyze and thus predict the pattern of the stock market. In the course of his calculating, Cohen decodes the hidden name of god which is encrypted in the Torah. What? Kabbala? I

Because of his success in both predicting the market and in finding god's long lost namer, Cohen is targeted by both religious zealots and corporate hitmen. And those are his mundane antagonists.

As a film, and as a vision, "Pi" succeeds wonderfully. 5 out of 4 stars, with bonus points for disembodied brains, computer sentence, and maybe the best cinematography this side of the Rubicon. A great soundtrack and website (www.pithemovie.com).




The big news, however, is that I was not replaced. The reason I returned? Outside interests drove me back.

CNU athletics has best year ever!


CNU wins state all-sports championship

Capping what may have been Christopher Newport's greatest athletic year ever, CNU has won the all-sports championship for all Division II and III schools in Virginia as compiled by the Virginia Sports Information Directors Association (VaSID). CNU teams compiled a school-record .659 winning percentage during the 1997-98 season, tops among all 19 eligible schools in the state. The Captains easily won the title, outpacing Randolph-Macon (.629) and Washington Lee (.610) the second and third place teams. CNU's men's teams were top in the state with a .722 winning percentage. Virginia Union was second at .649 and Virginia State third at .619. Washington Lee had the top women's percentage at .715, followed by Randolph-Macon at .694 and CNU at .610. 
Above: Steven Butler putting the Captain's up by two. Right: Player practices his hitting. Bottom: Tamara Pool defends in women's NCAA game last year.

Carolyn Guyton named new CNU head women's basketball coach

Carolyn Guyton, former Interim Head Coach and assistant at Hampton University and Assistant Coach at the University of Texas, has been named Head Women's Basketball Coach and Assistant to the Athletic Director for Academic Support at Christopher Newport University. It was announced today by Athletic Director C.J. Woollum. Guyton replaces Cathy Parson who left after ten years at CNU to become Assistant Coach of the Washington Mystics of the WNBA.

"I'm really excited about joining the winning tradition at Christopher Newport," said Guyton. "I'm ready to jump right in and continue that tradition, and maybe even go a little further. I'd love to see a national championship maybe a little further down the road."

A native of Austin, Texas, she graduated from Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, in 1987. While there she

was MVP of the basketball team for two years. She then moved to the University of Texas where she received her Master's Degree, with a specialization in Biomechanics, in 1990. She spent two years as a graduate assistant on the staff of highly-successful coach, Jody Conradt, and then two more as a fulltime assistant coach. In 1995 she joined the staff at Hampton University just as the Lady Pirates made the transition to Division I. She was the top assistant, recruiting coordinator and defensive coordinator until December of 1996 when she took over as Interim Head Coach for the remainder of the season. Last season she was Head Coach at Bethel Christian School in

Hampton, Va. At both Texas and Hampton, Guyton was significantly involved in the

academic support programs. After completion of her Bachelor's degree she had spent three years as Athletic Director at Hilltop

Baptist Academy in Cedar Park, Texas, and has taught both there and at Bethel Christian.

"I'm thrilled to have Carolyn join our staff," said Woollum. "We went through an intensive national search and found someone in our own back yard. Her credentials and respect in the women's basketball ranks are amazing. We're very fortunate to have found someone with that required balance of coaching and academic support experience."

Guyton takes over a solid program at CNU which has made appearances in the NCAA Division III National Championships six times in the 1990s. They have also won or shared the Dixie Conference regular season title every year but one during that period. The Lady Captains were 24-4 last year, their best record ever, and advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament

Jen Clark named CNU women's head soccer coach

Jen Clark, former assistant coach with the highly-successful William & Mary, Stanford and Dartmouth women's soccer programs, has been named Head Women's Soccer Coach at Christopher Newport University.

It was announced by Athletic Director C.J. Woollum. Clark takes over the newest Christopher Newport athletic program which began just last year. The Lady Captains posted a 5-11 record, but went 5-6 in their last 11 games under Emily Rice Randall, who left to pursue other interests outside of coaching.

Clark is a native of Aberdeen, Scotland, where she lived for 13 years before moving to New Hampshire. She graduated from Dartmouth College in 1994, where a knee injury limited her playing career to a single season. There, she began a coaching career that included stops at three institutions that all made appearances in the NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championship.

She spent three years at Dartmouth, where the Big Green were always among the top two in the Ivy League, and competed in the NCAA tournament once. She was head coach of the "B" team for two years and varsity assistant for one. From there

she moved on to Stanford, where her father, Bobby Clark, is Director of Soccer. In her only season there, the Cardinals also played in the NCAA championships. Last year she assisted at William & Mary, with the Tribe reaching the "Elite Eight" of the NCAA. She obtained her "A" License from the United States Soccer Federation in 1997. She also has the equivalent of a "B" License from the New Zealand Soccer Association, and has worked in the Olympic Development Program and coached youth soccer.

"I'm very excited at the chance to work at CNU and to help build that new program," said Clark. "With a very young team, I'll have a chance to try out some new things. CNU has great potential for growth in women's soccer."

We're thrilled to get a coach of Jen's stature to lead our young women's soccer program," commented Woollum. "She has outstanding credentials and her experiences will be of great benefit to us. I think she will lead our program to special places in the women's soccer world."

Clark joined the CNU staff in early July. The Lady Captains' second season kicks off Sept. 1 with a home match against Virginia Wesleyan.

Women's Soccer claims home opener in grudge match

In game that began with a Virginia Wesleyan cheer that included the phrase, "dream-on CNU," the Lady Captains won on a goal by freshman Jamie Stout with just 2:15 to play. Not one CNU player shook the hand of any Virginia Wesleyan in the season opener and debut of new head coach Jen Clark. Stout scored on an assist from last year's leading scorer Jackie Miller and avenged a 3-0 loss to the Marlins early last year. CNU got off to a quick start in the game, controlling virtually all of the first

ten minutes, but was unable to score. CNU outshot the Marlins, 19-14, including a late flurry at the end which resulted in the game-winner. Both teams engaged in pushing and shoving which brought on several whistles. Freshman Anne Johnson made eight saves in recording a shutout in her first collegiate game. CNU went 5-11 last year, its first women's soccer season ever, after getting off to an 0-5 start. The loss to Virginia Wesleyan in 1997 came in the second game of the year.
