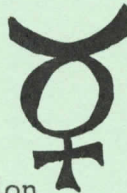

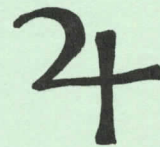

At this point in the development of Christopher Newport College, I feel that it is particularly important to support those programs which bring visiting speakers to our campus.
