FACULTY ACTIVITIES -- Drs. Linda Morgan and Aline Stomfay-Stitz presented the paper, "The Center for Effective Teaching: Improvement of College Instruction with a Multiple Agenda," at the Third National Conference on College Teaching and Learning in Jacksonville, Fla. on April 10. Dr. Stomfay-Stitz also gave a presentation on "Children's Literature: Multicultural and Multisensory" at the Centennial Conference, Association for Childhood Education International in Chicago on April 24.

ART HONORS -- CNC students took four of the nine prizes awarded at GENESIS: 1992 College Student Juried Exhibition at the Peninsula Fine Arts Center. The exhibition attracted 170 entries from 96 students at area colleges. Jeremy Hauser took second prize (\$100) for his untitled sculpture. The \$250 Watercolor Award went to Catherine Whitty for her painting Eddie Minor's Store. Honorable mentions went to Shannon C. Jeter for her painting I Still Don't Know Why, and to Reinaldo Morales for his painting Cradle III: the Id. Other CNC students whose work was accepted are Holly Labelle, Carol Ray and Ron Wheeler. The show will remain in place through May 10.

COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY -- Faculty will robe in the large gymnasium (Ratcliffe Hall) no later than 3:30 p.m. on May 10. The ceremony begins at 4 p.m. and will end around 6 p.m. Regalia for those who ordered rentals through the Registrar's Office will be in the large gym by 3 p.m.

HONORS CONVOCATION — The Honors Convocation will be Saturday May 9 at 4:30 p.m. Admission is by ticket only. Each participant and those faculty not on stage will be allocated three tickets (one for yourself and two for family or guests). Tickets are available at the Campus Center Information Desk during normal operation hours and from 3 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Convocation Day. Those requiring additional tickets should leave their name, telephone number and number of extra tickets needed at the Information Desk so that unclaimed tickets may be distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis. Seating cannot be reserved, and seats not claimed by 4:15 p.m. Convocation Day will be given away.

LATIN COURSES -- Latin 101-102 and 201-202 are among the options available for satisfying the language requirement in Area I and IV (pages 44-45 in the Catalog). They were put back in when the general language requirement went into effect two years ago. Many departments, however, made up their own guide sheets for advising at the time when Latin was not in the Catalog. The Department of Modern and Classical Languages and Literatures requests that appropriate changes be made so that both advisers and advisees are aware of this option.

FACULTY ACTIVITIES -- George Teschner presented the paper, "Postmodern Methodologies in Teaching Global Philosophy," at the Virginia Humanities Conference held at Virginia Tech, April 9-11.

Foreign Language Policies -- 1. Languages not taught at CNC (i.e. French, German, Japanese or Spanish) -- Any student from an accredited college or university who presents documentation of the study of a foreign language not taught at CNC will be considered to have completed the foreign language distribution requirement if she/he has completed through the 202 level for BA degrees or through the 102 level for BS and Professional degrees. In all cases the Department of Modern and Classical Languages and Literature will make the final determination. 2. Native speakers of languages not taught at CNC -- Any native speaker who has completed his/her secondary education (equivalent of high school) in an institution where the language of instruction is the same language as that claimed by the student as her/his native language, and who can produce documentation to this

effect, will be considered to have satisfied the CNC foreign language distribution requirement through the 202 level. No credit will be given in this case. In all cases the Dept. of MCLL will make the final determination. Credits for transfer students (1.) are handled by the Registrar's Office. Students who come under (2.) should be sent to Dr. Guthrie with the appropriate documentation.


