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### Dean's Colloquia Policy Changes

After discussion with Vice President Summerville, the Dean William Parks Colloquia Committee has agreed on two basic policy changes in the series. These are designed to better attain the purpose of the series, namely to have presented to the college community throughout the academic year the highest quality academically-oriented speakers available.

Beginning with the spring semester, 1984, one nationally known speaker will be invited to campus for a presentation with the Committee expending the amount necessary and available to secure a person of high stature. It may be possible to combine this person's appearance with a C.N.C. academic function such as an honor society initiation if suitable arrangements can be worked out.

Also beginning with next semester, the Committee will offer an honorarium of \$500 to each



C.N.C. faculty member chosen by the Committee to present a paper as part of the series. We are pleased that after several years of gratis presentations we are able to reward our own faculty members for their participation in the series. We also hasten to add that we have in the past invited members of the faculty to give presentations beyond their first and will continue to do so in the future.

Midway in the second semester we will call for nominations for an outside speaker and for nominations of and proposals from members of the C.N.C. faculty. We, therefore, ask that you now begin to formulate ideas, nominations, and proposals for our consideration. We realize that the Dean's Colloquia Series can only be as strong and viable as you make it.
