

Faculty/Staff News

Bruno Koch will be interviewed by Harriet Pazarelli on Channel 13 on Friday, November 25 at 9:00 A.M. The interview concerns the upcoming CNC Theatre production of Play Strindberg by Friedrict Dverrenmatt.

Larry Sacks gave the October presentation to the Hampton Roads Section, American Chemical Society, on Ionic Models in Chemical Bonding. This was the only technical paper given at the local section by a Section member in several years, all others being by national tour speakers.

Gary Hammer and Larry Sacks are attending the 31st Southeastern Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society in Roanoke, October 25-26. Larry is current Chairman of the Steering Committee for the S.E. Region and will conduct the activities of the Steering Committee in Roanoke.

Also, Bette Mosteller and Frank Edgcombe attended the Southeastern Library Association Tutorial on the second edition of the Anglo-American Cataloging Rules, held at Virginia Commonwealth University, Richmond, on October 12, 1979. The focus of the tutorial was on the changes in the Rules and their implications for the users of the card catalog.

Margaret Stewart was one of six librarians across the United States to serve as a consultant to the H. W. Wilson Company in revising the BOOK REVIEW DIGEST in New York on October 10-12. The READERS' GUIDE TO PERIODICAL LITERATURE and most other Wilson publications are updated frequently; however, the BOOK REVIEW DIGEST had not been updated for 18 years. The new revisions will be reflected in the April issue.

Vice President for Academic Affairs - ODU

Old Dominion University invites applications and nominations for the position of Vice President for Academic Affairs, to start July 1, 1980, or as soon as possible thereafter. Located in Norfolk, Virginia, Old Dominion University is a doctorate-granting, state supported, urban, regional institution, with an enrollment of approximately 14,000 students. The University offers undergraduate and graduate degrees through its schools of Arts and Letters, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Sciences and Health Professions, General Studies, Graduate Studies and Continuing Studies.

RESPONSIBILITIES: The Vice President for Academic Affairs is the chief academic officer who reports directly to the President and is responsible for the management of all academic programs and personnel; provides leadership in curricular and other academic matters, the allocation and management of resources, and in the selection, tenure and promotion of academic staff; and leads, directs, and coordinates the work of the academic deans.

OUALIFICATIONS: An earned doctorate with substantial academic experience and scholarly accomplishments, as well as proved leadership and management abilities are necessary. Candidates should possess a demonstrated skill in faculty relations and have a personal philosophy of higher education which is consistent with an urban university.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Degrees Committee

The Committee on Degrees met on October 17, 1979, at 12 noon. Dr. Burnam MacLeod was unanimously re-elected chairman.

The following student petitions were considered.

- Case #1 petitioned to waive the physical education distribution requirement for medical reasons. Committee Action: recommend approval under faculty guidelines and that student should substitute appropriate non-activities physical education course for the requirement. Medical statement is on file.
- Case #2 petitioned to have two German elective courses taken in transfer to satisfy the second half of the humanities distribution requirement of German 251, 252. Committee Action: recommend approval based on recommendation from the Dept.
- of Modern Languages. The recommendation is on file from the department. Case #3 - petitioned to waive ten of the last 36 hours of residency at CNC and that the last twelve hours in the major be waived.

Committee Action: recommend approval based upon the Department of History's recommendation.

Case #4 - petitioned to have the last 30 hours as a degree candidate waived. Committee Action: recommend approval based upon her major field department's recommendation and the fact that all of the student's hours have been at Christopher Newport.

Case #5 - petitioned to have 24 hours of his last 30 in residence waived. The student is currently enrolled for 6 hours and needs an additional 3 hours to graduate. Committee Action: recommend approval based upon the Dept. of Political Science's recommendation and the fact that the student will have had 101 hours at Christopher Newport.

All documentation on file. The meeting was adjourned.
