The series consists of formal presentations of papers of an academic nature based on original research and suitable for a general college audience. Five programs are normally scheduled each academic year, one by an outside guest and four by CNC faculty members.

Nominations for an outside speaker should include a brief resume of the nominee and a clear indication as to the subject he or she would likely address.

Proposals from CNC faculty members should include a precis of the paper to be presented. An honorarium of \$500 is extended to each faculty member chosen to give a paper as part of the series.

All nominations and proposals must be received by the chairman by Friday, April 13. No nominations or proposals will be considered after that date. The committee will announce its decisions before the end of the academic year.
