CATALOG UPDATE -- Please add the following information to summer session Term 3 on Page 5 of the '92 - '93 University Catalog: Thursday June 10 is the last day to withdraw without grade penalty; Thursday June 24 is the last day of classes, and Friday June 25 will be final examinations. NEH GRANTS -- The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced the 1993 Summer Stipends Program. Deadline for submission of final proposals is Oct. 1, 1992. Preliminary proposals must be in by Sept. 15, 1992. Institutional nomination for this program is required and application materials are now available. No more than three faculty members may be nominated. Stipends are fixed at \$4,000 for projects without travel and \$4,750

for projects with travel. The NEH is also sponsoring two initiatives, "The Emergence of Democracy" and the "Columbian Quincentenery." ^{*}The McMurran Hall Labs are comprised of a PC-DOS networked lab of 20 computers, a Digital Equipment Advanced Workstation Network of 25 DEC 5100 workstations (which manages access to INTERnet), and the Computer Resource Center described below.

The Computer Resource Center

The Resource Center is located in McMurran Hall, room 123. It contains computer equipment for disabled students and faculty, two DEC work stations, two diskfull PC DOS computers with printers, 8 APPLE IIe computers with printers, 5 MAC SE Macintosh computers connected to a laser printer. The Resource Center is intended primarily for the use of faculty who wish to spend time with their students in a computer environment outside of their offices and the open labs and for administrative staff to experiment with different computer systems.

Reservations of Labs and Electronic Classroom by Faculty

Reservations for the use of Gosnold 123 during non-class hours and other labs at any hour can be made by calling the Office of Information Technology Services (ITSV) at x4-7180. Reservations are limited to one hour intervals, twice a semester per class.
