

April Meeting of the Instructional Faculty

The Instructional Faculty will meet at 3:00 p.m., Friday, April 25, 1986, in A-105. Committee chairmen and individual faculty members who wish to place items of business on the agenda for consideration at this meeting must submit the substance of such items to this office no later than noon, Wednesday, April 16, 1986. It would be helpful to all concerned if all committee reports to be presented at this meeting were submitted for publication by this deadline as well. The agenda will be published in the Chronicle of April 18, 1986.

This will likely be the last meeting of the Instructional Faculty of the 85-86 academic year. Accordingly, we will, among other things, be acting on the approval of spring graduates and on elections to fill eleven seats on seven standing committees.

As is the case with all meetings of the Instructional Faculty, all other members of the academic community are welcome to attend as observers.

Plan of Compensation

At its meeting of 3/26/86, the Board of Visitors of Christopher Newport College approved the following plan of compensation for full-time salaried members of the instructional faculty in the 1986-1987 academic year.

PLAN OF COMPENSATION

Whereas, The Governor's Consolidated Salary Authorization for Teaching and Research Staffs in Institutions of Higher Education requires that the Board of Visitors shall establish a compensation plan for each year of the biennium in accordance with the provisions of legislative requirements; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Visitors approves the following Plan of Compensation for Christopher Newport College for the fiscal year 1986-1987:

1. Academic year salaries for instructional faculty in each academic rank shall be consistent with the following intervals:

RANK	MINIMUM	MAXIMUM
PROF	\$32000	\$46500
ASOP	\$28000	\$39500
ASTP	\$24000	\$33000
INST	\$20000	\$27000

- 2. Subject and subordinate to the conditions in (1) above, the academic-year salary increment for returning members of the instructional faculty shall be no less than eight percent (8%) and no more than eighteen percent (18%); the actual average of such increments shall be within one-half of one percent of twelve percent (12%).
- 3. The amount of contractual salary to be offered each member of the instructional faculty for the academic year 1986-1987 shall be determined by the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Such amount shall be consistent with relevant considerations of rank, seniority, educational achievements, market forces, and (in the case of returning faculty) quality of service. All final determinations of contractual salary are subject to negotiation between the individual employee and the VPAA (representing the College), consistent with the above requirements.

Dean's Appointment

At its meeting of 3/26/86, the Board of Visitors of Christopher Newport College approved the appointment of Dr. Terry L. Maris as Dean of the School of Business and Economics and Associate Professor in the Department of Management and Marketing. Dr. Maris, who is now serving as assistant dean of the College of Business Administration at Eastern Illinois University, will assume his new position at Christopher Newport College on July 1, 1986.

I wish to extend the thanks of this office to the search committee, to the faculty of the School of Business and Economics, and to all others who participated in the selection process that resulted in this appointment.

A Message to the Commonwealth's Employees - Applicable to Classified Emplo (J. D. Eagle, 4/2/86)

Now that the 1986 General Assembly session is concluded, I wish to take th reaffirm my commitment to the Commonwealth's pay for performance program.

Virginia's leadership has for some time wanted a system that would provide peak performance and, by so doing, help agencies to attract and retain the employees. The pay for performance system provides just such an incentive reinstating proficiency increases last July, the system includes the lump-of \$1,000 to up to 20 percent of each agency's most exceptional performers supervisors to recognize and encourage extraordinary job performance.

One legislative action that may be of particular interest to you affects the exceptional performance awards will be given to state employees. This action the amount of the Exceptional Performance Award or the number of award win alter the schedule from a quarterly to an annual payout.

I remain committed to the principles behind the pay for performance system communication between supervisor and employee is vital, that employees show salary range, be able to progress if they are performing satisfactorily, as tional performance should be encouraged and rewarded.
